**It is in the Man.**

Over a quarter of a century ago, Hoard's Dairyman commenced laying stress on the proposition that there was no hope of improvement in American farming until the American farmer was improved in knowledge, power to think, skill of action. At the bottom lies a serious lack of the knowledge that is necessary to be a good farmer. And mark how wonderfully the means for obtaining that knowledge have been increased in twenty-five years.

The main consideration with the state and nation should be the raising up and educating of a body of farmers who can farm without destroying the fertility of their farms. That is the fundamental question. But little can be done with the old farmer. He will go on as he has gone. He has never made a study of the three elements of soil fertility; nitrogen, potash and phosphate. His practice shows all over the Union, that he hardly knows how to properly care for barnyard manure.

But we can reach the boy, the farmer that is to be. He has no prejudice against the knowledge that comes in books and papers. His mind is open to the impressions of scientific truth, if he can be put under the press. The hope of the future of American agriculture lies in the American farm boy. Old eyes look longingly on the grand things he will be able to do in the next quarter of a century, when knowledge shall have increased a thousand fold.
