The crickets and katydids are doing their best to let us know that good old summer time is pretty well over for this season.

Six hundred tons of barnacles are reported to have been taken from the bottom of the battleship South Dakota, which was recently docked.

People throughout Oregon, regardless of their church affiliations, are glad to know that Dr. J. W. Brougher, pastor of the White Temple in Portland, has decided to remain with his charge. He was invited to go to Los Angeles to take the place made vacant by the resignation of Bob Burdette, and had about decided to accept, but such pressure was brought to bear on him by the officials of the Portland church and others that he decided to remain with the work in that city. Dr. Brougher is a man Oregon could not well afford to lose.

Gene M. Simpson, of Corvallis, who was the first man in Oregon to make a success of raising China pheasants, and who is now engaging in the business on an extensive scale, has issued a very neat booklet of sixteen pages well illustrated, entitled "Pheasant Farming," which he sells at twenty-five cents. He says he is securing so many letters of inquiry about raising the birds that he is not able to answer all personally and consequently he has published this booklet which will furnish amateur pheasant fanciers with the information they need. In this connection we will say that the writer bought of Mr. Simpson, the first pair of birds he ever sold, which were sent to Kansas where they were greatly admired.

The new Y. M. C. A. building in Portland is fitted out with a swimming pool and the management proposes to teach all of the 2000 members how to swim. This is well. People ought to know how to swim and a pool provided with instructors is a good place to learn, but since very many good swimmers drown, an effort ought to be made to impress on those who can swim the folly of taking unnecessary chances, especially in our mountain streams where there are always cold currents of water that are liable to produce cramps. The trait for taking fool-hardy chances seems to be abnormally developed in a large per cent of the good swimmers, hence the long list of casualties among this class in Oregon.

Albany is to have an apple fair October 27 to 29 when prizes ranging from two dollars to fifty dollars will be awarded. Daily programs are being arranged and the second day will be "apple day," when all sorts of delicacies will be served, including apple dumpings, fritters, pie, jelly, sauce, butter, cider—in fact every kind of a dish that can be made from apples. Such fairs serve to stimulate apple growing and the study of the best methods of caring for trees and the destruction of pests, and are well worthy of the patronage of the general public. Albany will no doubt have a successful fair and it will do much to advertise the Willamette valley as an apple growing district. Every county in the valley ought to have a fruit fair of some kind. Since the above was written it has been announced that Yamhill will hold an apple fair.

The time was when little attention was given to architectural design in building, about Newberg, but we are glad to note that better taste is being shown by nearly everyone who is building, these days. It does not answer now to mark out an L shaped foundation on a scrap of paper and tell a carpenter to go to work. Some attention must be given to the outside appearance of the house; it must conform to modern ideas in architecture, and then there are many details that must be worked out in the arrangement of the various rooms, for comfort and convenience, by one who is experienced. It may cost a little more to do this, but people who build, are beginning to realize that it pays to get the experience of those who are endowed with the know how, before work is begun.

WHAT YE HEAR.

The following clipping from the Jacksonville Post is well worth reading: "Take heed what ye hear" as to slanderous reports and insinuations. There is a vast amount of defamation in the world. Perhaps we have all suffered more or less by it, hence one would think we might be prepared to estimate it at its real value. But notwithstanding our own experience in regard to its evils, how prone we are to listen to what evil tongues may say of our neighbors! Though jealous enough for our own reputation we seem to have little concern for that of others. We should remember that we have no more right to hear what evil tongues may say, than evil tongues have to say what they ought not. We could not give the tongue of slander a more pointed and successful rebuke than to refuse to listen to it. If we are watchful of our ears, others would be constrained to bridle their tongues. If all men were deaf and blind there would be no slander, because there would be none to hear or read it, and the unruly member would of necessity be kept in order. But now there are hearers and readers, and hence the tongue and pen must be guarded. Idle words are often the cause of inestimable mischief. A good name is rather to be chosen than riches. But the tongue of slander may rob us of our good name and leave us poor indeed. What havoc has been made of the peace and happiness of individuals, of families, of neighborhoods by an evil tongue! What were but trifles are swelling into importance by repetition, and thus difficulties which a single word might have explained and healed, increase in magnitude and at last become incurable. The tongue will be evil while the heart is wrong, for out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh. The best remedy for an evil tongue is a new heart, but as even the best of us are sanctified in part, we must adopt such a remedy as will meet the evil from whatever source it may come; and this is the remedy: Take heed what ye hear. We must refuse to listen to what the evil tongue says. Listening to slander is so nearly related to slander itself that, if we give place to the one, we are likely to be infected with the other. The listener is partaker with the speaker; therefore, at all times, now and ever, take heed what ye hear—don't hear everything, and don't repeat everything you hear.

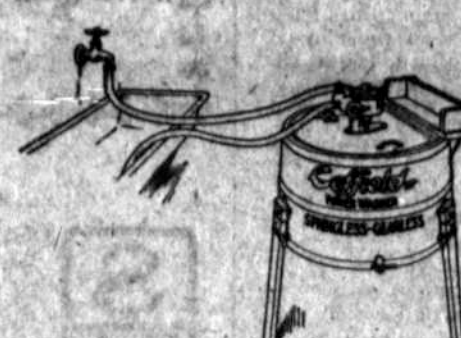
