Citizens of Newberg!

The new Catholic church in Newberg will be dedicated next Sunday, October 10, at 10 A.M., by Right Rev. Abbot Thomas, of Mt. Angel. Rev. Father Cantwell, of Portland, will deliver the sermon. Rev. H. J. McDevitt will celebrate the mass. Many visitors from outside are expected. The only Catholic chapel car in the United States will be in Newberg that day. McAmbrose Petry, of Chicago, gave \$12,000 to build and equip this car that it might bring the blessings of religion to places where there are no Catholic churches. It will remain in Newberg till Saturday, October 16 and then go to Sheridan, Oregon. A mission will open in the Catholic church next Sunday evening at 7:45 and continue till Saturday, October 16. The morning services will be in the chapel car—mass and a short instruction. The evening services in the church will consist of a lecture on Catholic doctrine followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. No one can be a truly well educated person who does not know what the Catholic church is, her history, her doctrines and her practices. She is the most wonderful organization the world has ever known. She has a membership of over 250,000,000 in the world, over 14,000,000 in the United States. She deserves careful study.
