The Portland papers say Norman Bros., of Spokane and Tacoma have secured an option on the Portland hotel on a basis of \$190 a share, or \$950,000, and that if the sale is completed, which appears to be a certainty, the building will be increased in height and also in the size of the annex on the Sixth street side. Considering the size of the Portland there is scarcely a hotel in any of the big cities of the country that equals it in beauty of architecture, and it is to be hoped that in rebuilding it the pretty design will not be sacrificed for the sake of room.

The Oregonian of Tuesday gives this tribute to the memory of Mrs. Ladd, widow of the late W. S. Ladd, of Portland. "With eulogy well befitting the prominent part that she had borne in social and charitable lines, and of her quiet walk in womanly ways in this community for more than fifty-five years, the obsequies of the late Caroline Ames Ladd were observed in the First Presbyterian Church yesterday. Her span out-ran the limit of four-score years allotted to human life, but, except as she was regarded with increased affection and veneration year after year, Mrs. Ladd was not regarded as old by those who were associated with her in her domestic, social or charitable life. A woman of fine intuitions, good judgment and excellent executive ability, she was for many years an active and efficient worker in the organized charities of the city, and especially with the missionary policy of the First Presbyterian Church. Favored by fortune, she was a generous almoner; favored by nature, she was a faithful wife, an affectionate mother, a loyal friend. She will be missed."

The Eugene Register says: "It begins to look like the Welch and United Railway lines are to work together in the valley as competitors of the Oregon Electric to give us two electric systems instead of one. If this should prove true and two electric lines should be run out of Portland up to Eugene it would be all the better for the whole valley. It would only cause more rapid development of the country the line would traverse." When the Willamette valley is brought up to that high state of cultivation which the soil will justify, there will be business sufficient to pay good returns on the investment in the building of electric lines through every section of the valley. And the building of electric lines now, will hasten the day when the products of our valley lands will be more than four fold over what they are today. So far we have been touching only the high places and skimming a little off of the top. With the application of scientific methods and cultivation "up to the handle," the future has in store great things for the Willamette valley.
