Senator Cummins, of Iowa, the leader of the "insurgent" forces in the senate, threw down the gauntlet in a speech delivered in Chicago last week, as "Uncle Joe" has already taken notice. It begins to look like the next session of congress would see something doing.

Some one expressed surprise the other day on seeing a lady who is engaged in the poultry business in Newberg, walking our streets dressed in silks. But why shouldn't a poultry raiser dress in silks these days? It is the consumer of hen fruit who must be content to wear calico street gowns.

The first number of the Forest Grove Press has reached this office. E. C. Klanke is the publisher and B. C. Suit, editor. It is a five-column quarto, though a larger paper is promised when the patronage will justify it. The first number shows up with a very good advertising patronage for a starter and it is ably edited.

It is no unusual thing to hear a new arrival in the country making the complaint that real estate is too high, but we take notice that these same fellows after they have been located a few months do not hesitate to make a very substantial raise in the figures, when they offer their property for sale. Possibly it is all in getting accustomed to it.

The Telephone Register is right in suggesting that "the farmers of Yamhill county ought to get together and hold a dairy convention in the interest of that most profitable branch of farming." The Graphic has always maintained that the producing classes are too prone to stick to the old system of going it alone, and neglecting to meet together to exchange ideas with those who are engaged in the same occupation. It is a very dull man who is unable to get some new ideas that will be of use to him, by hearing a neighbor tell his experiences. "In a multitude of counselors there is safety" but among farmers, as a rule, it is every fellow for himself.

A gentleman representing a Portland music house called at the Graphic office one day last week and asked for advertising space at a rate more than one-third less than we are charging our home merchants, and they are getting a low rate. He appeared to be surprised when he was refused space at his offer and went on to state that he was carrying space in the Albany, Corvallis and Dallas papers at his price. Possibly his statement was true, although the Graphic is always inclined to take the assertions of such fellows with several grains of allowance for shrinkage in dry weather, but anyway if the Graphic has any special favors to grant to advertisers it prefers to first remember its friends up and down the street, upon whom it must depend for business that is worth while throughout the year. Even in this day the "foreign" advertiser is no doubt able to land an occasional sucker up and down the valley, who will take his stuff just to "fill up" at the loss of his self respect as a legitimate newspaper publisher, but the Graphic is not in that class, thank you. We are here to do a legitimate

business on business principles, giving full value for what we receive in payment for space, and while we do sometimes give things away, to children, grown up folks are expected to pay for what they get. Those who expect anything else are very few.

Wm. Robinson, a successful newspaper man of New Mexico, declines the appointment as Governor of that Territory, saying that he does not have the necessary qualifications for the position, and further that he would not give up the newspaper business to become President. Here is a man who is wise enough to foresee the folly of giving up an avocation in which he has succeeded well, to accept a position of honor and trust for which he has not had the necessary training.

The people who patronize the Southern Pacific at Rex, have importuned the officials of the road at different times to furnish some accommodations at that point in the way of a depot, but so far without avail. They have no shelter for freight, nor even a platform to pile freight on, to say nothing of shelter for passengers. They say they have received some promises in the dim past from the officials but they have all gone glimmering and they are now contemplating laying the matter before the railroad commissioners. Before this is done the Graphic would recommend that the attention of the company be again called to the matter and immediate action asked for. Rex is entitled to better accommodations and if the case is pressed it will no doubt bring results.

Harry Murphy is a very clever cartoonist and his work on the first page of the Oregonian is always watched for with a great deal of interest by the many readers of that most excellent paper, but we doubt if he enjoyed his work in carrying out the instructions of his employers for last Monday's issue, when he held up the old soldiers to ridicule before the country as a lot of pension beggars. There may be some instances where young women have mated with grizzled veterans with a view of living as pensioned widows in a few short years, and in some rare cases pensions granted to old soldiers may have been excessive, as the Oregonian says, but it is "adding insult to injury" to hold the old veterans of the Civil War as a whole, up to ridicule on account of it, and few there are who will approve such a course.

The pastor of one of the Newberg churches recently expressed to the editor of the Graphic his dislike for being addressed by the term "Rev." and as we think with a show of good sense, for neither do we like the prefix, but since it is the custom to use it we can't very well do otherwise than to follow the crowd, lest we appear to show a lack of courtesy. Again we heard a minister in the course of a sermon say he never felt called upon to wear a suit of a cut different from the style prevailing among the common run of men with whom he mingled, and in fact he said he would not do it, as he deemed it unwise to do so, and it was also distasteful to him to think of it. We heartily agree with this minister also and believe that if all the ministers of the gospel took the same sensible view and would act accordingly, the gulf that often exists between the people and "the preacher" would be very materially circumscribed.

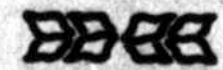
