Newberg tries to make it easy for people to do the right thing by respecting the law, but when a man deliberately defies the law, and the better element of society who have said repeatedly by their votes that they are unalterably opposed to the sale of liquor in our midst, it is just and right that he should pay the penalty of the law when he is caught. Taking this view of the matter, and it can't be gainsaid, Justice Brouillette did the right thing when he imposed a jail sentence on St Germain for selling liquor to minors. Nominal fines in these cases do no good. The money is made up among the push who are equally guilty, and they laugh at the law. Rigid enforcement of the law by those in authority when convictions are made, by giving the guilty parties something they will remember, is demanded by the people, and a jail sentence counts most in these whiskey cases. It gives time for reflection.

It is a very pretty custom this giving of presents at Christmas time but it is well to remember that those of your friends who are well balanced mentally, not only do not expect you to impoverish yourself in an effort to provide gifts for them, but they would feel hurt if they knew you had done so. Strain a point it need be to gladden the hearts of the little folks, but let the older people shift for themselves, rather than buy more than you can pay for without embarrassment.

Possibly it is merely by an oversight on the part of our friend, Mr. McMurray in the distribution of those gasoline motor cars, that Newberg is left on the waiting list, but we would like to call his attention to the fact that with every increased accommodation in transportation facilities the company has given Newberg, we have responded promptly with increased traffic for the road. This fact can be easily verified by an examination of the books in the office of the station agent.

The business men of Oregon City make the open charge that the Southern Pacific, the O. W. P. and the river lines have entered into an agreement to hold up freight rates. One merchant stated at a meeting held recently that he paid 75 cents per hundred on a freight shipment from Chicago to Portland and 10 cents per hundred from Portland to Oregon City, and said that if on the long haul he had been charged in proportion as he was for the short haul there would not have been enough money in Clackamas county to pay the bill.

Ex-Senator Fulton no doubt has good cause for his intense feeling of resentment toward Francis J. Heney, but it looks like he had allowed himself to be led by this feeling to take a stand in a public address before the Oregon Bar Association that will not strengthen him with the people. BARBAROUS MEXICO

John Kenneth Turner who is writing a series of articles for the American magazine under the title of "Barbarous Mexico," tells in the November number about a trip he took to Yucatan to find out, as he says, what became of the Yaqui Indians of Sonora. He says: "In common with thousands of other Americans who have lived for years in our Southwest and near the border line of Mexico, I knew something of the sufferings of the Yaquis in their native state, of the means which had been taken to stir them to revolt, of the confiscation of their lands, of the methods of extermination employed by the army, of the indignation voiced by the decent element of society. I knew that the order of deportation had been carried out, that hundreds of families had been gathered up monthly and sent away to exile. But what fate was waiting them there at the end of the road? The answer was always vague, indefinite, unsatisfactory."

Mr. Turner follows in his article with the account of his trip to Yucatan where he found that the brutality of African slavery in our own Southland was being equaled in the treatment of the Yaquis by those into whose hands they were sold as slaves. He saw them whipped and beaten into an insensible condition by heartless slave drivers. The women are compelled to marry Chinamen in order to bare children who in turn become slaves.

Mr. Turner tells in with a colonel in the Mexican army who for the past four years, has had immediate charge of the deportation of all the Yaquis to Yucatan, and he frankly told him that in three and a half years he had delivered 15,700 Yaquis in Yucatan, while twenty per cent of those he started with died of starvation and exposure while on the way. He further said "These Yaquis sell in Yucatan or \$65 apiece—men, women and children. Who gets the money? Well, \$10 goes to me for my services. The rest is turned over to the Secretary of War."

We will not quote further from the story, but will say that one who has felt his blood boil while reading "Uncle Tom's Cabin," will experience something of the same feeling in reading this account by Mr. Turner, of the heartless brutality of the Mexican government in conniving at such treatment of a race of human beings.
