Resolutions of Respect.

To the officers and members of Shiloh Post No. 77 Department of Oregon:

The committee appointed at the last regular meeting of this post to prepare "Memorial Resolutions" to Comrade B. R. Pendleton beg to report as follows: Comrade B. R. Pendleton was born in Kentucky, November 12, 1832 and resided in that state until the breaking out of the Civil War, when he enlisted in the service of his country in the 10th Kentucky Infantry, in which Regiment he attained the rank of Captain, and was honorably discharged after more than two years' service and having been wounded, and a prisoner of war for some months. Comrade Pendleton early joined the Grand Army of the Republic and in 1904 served as commander of John F. Miller Post No. 42 Dep't of Oregon, and joined Shiloh Post by transfer in 1908. He died at Lafayette, Oregon, October 27, 1909, and was followed to his last resting place by the members of Shiloh Post. Under the flag he loved so well, under the tender care of the organization of which he was so proud, he sleeps in the state of his adoption. Whether a monument shall be raised to him, or whether over him the grass shall grow and flowers planted by loving hands while the spot is remembered shall blossom, is a matter of indifference. The man's record made here will be remembered while the history of the patriotism of the country is kept alive, and while the story of the Grand Army of the Republic is repeated; for what he did and what he was we love him:

"Green be the grass above thee,
 Friend of our stalwart days;
 None knew thee but to love thee,
 None named thee but to praise."
