Portland Notes.

Portland takes fourth place among cities of the United States in wheat exports for the 11 months of the current year ending with November. This is according to the report of the Secretary of the Treasury on breadstuffs exported from this country. Puget Sound comes next after Portland. New York is first, Philadelphia second and Duluth third. Last year Portland ranked second in the country in wheat shipments. The figures just compiled of wheat exports do not include large shipments of wheat from Portland to California. This tonnage is very heavy each year.

The fine new steamship Bear for the run between Portland and San Francisco will start west from Newport News, Virginia, January 9, and her sister ship,

the Beaver, will come soon after. Both will go into commission at once upon arrival. These boats are the new Harriman liners built for the coast route and are the finest ever in commission between here and the south.

A splendid show was held, many of the prize fowls having been on exhibition at the recent Seattle Exposition.
