Newberg W. C. T. U.

The W. C. T. U. met at the
home of Mrs. Bowerman, Janu-
ary 12, 1910.

Devotional exercises were con-
ducted by the Evangelistic Supt.
Mary J. Newlin. Mrs. Harford
was present and sang "A New
State Song" which was com-
posed by herself.

Roll call indicated 20 members
present. Some visitors were also
present. After the reading of
the minutes a letter was read
from Ella W. Matlock in which
many thanks were expressed and
high appreciation for the boxes
of fruit sent them which they
received in fine condition. The
Treasurer forwarded \$1.16 cents
for year books, also two names
for the paper.

Mrs. Harford informed the
union that the National Union
had changed the name of the
drink known as punch to Fruice,
from fruit and juice from which it
is made.

The reports from the supts. of
the different departments of work
were gratifying and were ac-
cepted as read.

Mrs. Hannon as chairman of
the committee on the use of
cigarettes by the school boys, re-
ports that she finds the super-
intendent of schools in harmony
with the union and willing to do
all he can to improve conditions,
but finds the work difficult be-
cause some parents sanction the
use of tobacco by their boys.
Mrs. Harford spoke of the law on
the subject. The committee was
continued with an addition of
three members. Mrs. Wright
and Mrs. Hodson were appointed
the committee to visit the schools
in January.

The supt. of the flower mission
was instructed to formulate some
plan for raising funds for their
department. Mrs. Scott was
voted two dollars for services in
L. T. L. work. Mrs. Harford
suggested that the L. T. L. raise
funds by holding 10 cent socials.
Mrs. Thorne offered her home for
the first social. The matter of a
School Savings bank was pre-
sented by Mrs. Hannon. A com-
mittee was appointed to look in-
to the matter further and if
thought feasible to enlist the
School Board to take up the
matter.

Mrs. Patterson, Mrs. Lutz and
Mrs. Harvey were appointed to
visit the sick during January.
Mrs. Sloan gave her name as a
member of the union, 22 new
members have been received since
August 1909 and seven meetings
were held.

Dues were received and the
meeting adjourned.
