Small Enterprises That Paid

"A Pennsylvania girl writes me that she gathered and washed feathers and down for a whole year," says Anna Steese Richardson in Woman's Home Companion for February. "The next summer she made it up into pillows, using attractive ticking and chintz, and sold them to guests at a mountain resort eight miles away. She offered the pillows at a trifle less than the price asked in city shops, but the appeal to city folk lay in the fact that they were real feather pillows from the country."

"A girl who lived in New Jersey, within commuting distance of New York, started a hotbed raising fresh lettuce and radishes. These she boldly carried to New York in a suit-case and sold to other people working in the office where she was employed. To-day that girl has a good-sized truck-farm, employs several hands and does not have to work in a city office."

"Away out in Nebraska a farmer's daughter tried to do the same thing, believing that she could induce the green-grocers in the nearest town to handle her fresh lettuce and radishes rather than those shipped in by commission merchants. The dealers were afraid to give her any encouragement. Her supply might not be up to the standard. She might not raise enough to supply them and then they would not know how much to expect from her and how much from the commission merchants!"

"The girl made a house-to-house canvass among housewives and offered them freshly-picked vegetables at the same price they had been paying for the hothouse supply shipped in. She was just brave enough not to cut under the prices of the local grocers. Her list of customers grew. She came to town three times a week. The green-grocers discovered that she was cutting into their trade. They capitulated. To-day she supplies them all, sends hothouse products to town three times a week in winter, and garden truck every day in summer."

"Another girl visiting a meat-packing plant was told by the guide of the poor quality of aprons furnished the butchers. She boldly offered to provide aprons of better material and appealed to the purchasing agent and got her chance."

Some Pertinent Suggestions.

EDITOR GRAPHIC: On Friday of last week the Newberg Commercial Club met for the purpose of devising plans for the coming year's work.

While the attendance was good and gentlemen from various callings were present, the most remarkable feature of the evening was the absence of so many who should be and who are vitally interested in just such meetings. Many subjects of importance were discussed but most attention was given to the question of how best to make known to the Eastern people the advantages of our particular district. The Commercial Club has done much in the past for promotion of this valley and the results are apparent to any one who cares to look, but the burden of this work and expense has not been evenly divided. There are men in this community, now at work, that have worked and given of their time and money for twenty years past, to build up the material good of our city property and outside farms, who have given freely days and months of their time to build up our schools, our churches, our manufactures, our good streets, our good farms, so as to make possible the very things you today possess and enjoy. The farm you held some years ago at thirty-five dollars that today you can sell at two hundred dollars has been made so by this labor. The schools that a few years ago were run by two teachers to-day employ ten

times that number as a result of this labor. The town of one or two stores a few years has developed a demand for twenty-five times that by this labor. Our city of few years ago that failed to furnish enough labor for a town-marshal to-day employs street superintendents, plumbers, laborers, teamsters, carpenters, engineer, etc, all created by this labor. The drayage of this town years ago would not support one man and team, but now the express wagons, drays, transfers and busses are demanded and supported as result of this labor. The reputation of this city as a manufacturing center is heralded all over the state as returns for this labor. The valuable qualities of soil and favorable climatic conditions of our country have been made known to hundreds of home builders by this labor. You to whom this applies have benefited by advance upon advance in money value of your holdings and avocations and have been made intrinsically what you are by this labor.

Since the Chehalem Valley Board of Immigration first paid for and distributed all over the East the first picture of Chehalem Valley and made the name a synonym for "Garden of Eden" have these unselfish few earnest men stood by the work until to-day our valley is what the name signifies, "Valley of Flowers." Now how much have you done?

We need your assistance and in all justice it is due you to give it. In the spirit of fairplay, give us your attendance at public meetings, and give us your thoughts, and advice, and your help.

Suggestive Quotations on the Sunday School Lesson by Rev. Lincoln for the International Newspaper Bible Study Club.

FEBRUARY 6, 1910.

Almsgiving and Prayer. Matt. 6:1-15 Golden Text. Take heed that ye do not your righteousness before men to be seen of them. Matt. 6:1.

Verses 1-4.—What definition would you give of an hypocrite?

If a man is really trying to be a true Christian, but loves to have his good works acknowledged by the church and the world, and takes pains to have that done, how would you characterize him?

If a man gives more to religion and charity when the fact is published, than he does when it is not known, in what class would you place him?

If one gives with the motive of helping his fellows and to glorify God, will the fact that his beneficence is published displease God? Why?

Verses 5-6.—Give reasons for your opinion as to whether there are those today who act as if they were religious, in the matter of going to church etc., but who are not actually true to God? How would you describe a man who goes to church or prayer meeting chiefly to help his business or profession?

If a man prays longer in public than he does in private, is he necessarily a hypocrite?

Why does Jesus so strongly recommend private prayer, and what are its advantages?

Verses 7.—What would you say for, or against, long or short private prayers? In what class would you put those private prayers which consist only of reading, or reciting, set prayers, and in repeating a form of words?

Verses 8.—As God certainly knows what things we have need of before we ask Him, what is the use in praying for them?

Verses 9.—Did Jesus give the "Lord's Prayer" as a form to be used, or as a model for comprehensiveness and brevity, or for both, or for some other reason?

What was the chief thing in the life and personal testimony of Jesus, which also should, and may, be the chief thing in the life of every man?

Verses 10.—What should we long and pray for more than for all else?

What would turn earth and its sorrows, into Heaven with all its blessedness?

Verses 11.—Have Christians a right to expect that God will supply all the necessities of life, and does he always do so?

Is God under obligation to supply us with daily bread?

Verses 12.—On what grounds does God forgive us our sins?

Does Jesus mean here that God will forgive us exactly as we forgive others, or is there a difference?

Verses 13.—In what way does God lead us into temptation?

Verses 14, 15.—If we forgive our fellows, is God under obligation to forgive us?
