Womanly Wisdom.

Nothing tastes better to the children after they get home from school than nice bean soup. Other kinds may do now and then, but bean soup is always good.

Many folks put salt in the water in which they boil green corn and then they wonder what makes the kernels so hard. Try leaving the salt out and see if that doesn't fix the matter all right.

Soaking the hands above the wrists in hot water will sometimes relieve a headache. I found this out while washing dishes and clothes when my head was aching. Keeping the feet warm at the same time also helps.

Sheets and long table-cloths are bad things to take from the boiler to the tub on washdays. Did you ever think of looping them up in a big loose knot before placing them into the boiler? Try that and see if you don't find it a great improvement.

When a baby is fed with a bottle, the milk often gets too cool before he has finished it. A rubber bag filled with hot water and placed under the bottle will keep it warm, and also serve as a support to tip the bottle of milk at the right angle for him to get it easily.

Green tomatoes will make excellent pies next winter if you pare them, cut in thick slices, and to seven pounds of them add three pounds of sugar and cook very slowly till clear and tender. Do not add any water. When the pies are made, thin slices of lemon added will improve the flavor.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON.

Suggestive Quotations on the Sunday School Lesson by Rev. Linneott for the International Newspaper Bible Study Club.

FEBRUARY 12, 1910.

Worldliness and Trust. Matt. 6:19-35. Golden Text. Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you. Matt. 6:33.

Verses 19.—What would Jesus have every man to consider as his chief "treasure?" (See Matt. 6:35.)

What is the test as to what a man's "treasure" is, or that which he values most highly?

If Jesus here does not forbid a man to provide in the present, for the future temporal needs of himself and family, what is it he does forbid?

Verses 20.—What is implied in laying up treasure in heaven, and how is it done?

Verses 21.—How would you demonstrate that "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also?"

Verses 22, 23.—The "eye" is what the body sees with and distinguishes one thing from another, what is the faculty of the soul which answers to the eye of the body?

If the judgment is biased and the conscience perverted, how would that effect the views which a man may have of moral and spiritual questions?

Verses 24.—What does the word "mammon" stand for here?

Why is it impossible for a man to "serve" both God and "mammon?"

When a man's chief dependence is upon money, what God does he worship?

Verses 25-27.—Why is our temporal welfare assured if we depend wholly upon God?

What are the natural effects of anxious care upon a man's ability to make proper provisions for the future, and upon his present peace of mind?

What is the only effectual cure for the common malady of anxious care?

What are the chief evils of anxiety? Why is dependence upon God impossible, while we are filled with anxious care about our temporal needs?

Verses 28-31.—In considering the lilies, their freedom from toil, their growth and their beauty, what lessons may we learn of personal and perfect trust in God for our raiment?

What is the tendency of perfect trust in God, upon our habits of self help and general industry?

If a person trusts wholly in God, as Jesus commanded and practiced, why is he as sure to be as perfect in his sphere as a lily in its sphere?

Seeing that God is to all of us what the most loving father is to his children, what effect should that fact have upon our peace of mind concerning future temporal needs?

What is the root of all anxious care? Verses 32.—What is the fundamental difference between a saint and a sinner?

Verses 33, 34.—What reason can you give, for the accuracy of the statement of Jesus, that if we make the kingdom of God and its righteousness our first care, that all our temporal wants will thereby be provided for?
