Portland Notes.

Oregon is to get wide publicity throughout the East during the coming year if the plan of Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway, works out. Mr. Hill proposes to gather exhibits of what Oregon takes and place them in an exhibit car which will be sent East and routed through the sections of the country where it will do the most good. That these exhibits will accomplish a great deal, accompanied as they will be by a lecturer, is certain and that many thousands of settlers will be brought to this state as a direct result is believed.

Portland is to have an aviation meet March 5, 6, and 7. Business men have organized a three-day exhibition of flying machines and D. O. Lively has been made manager of the event. Charles K. Hamilton, celebrated aviator who made flights at the Los Angeles meet and captured many prizes, will be the star of the coming contests and will try to set new world's records for altitude, high and low speed flights. Four local aeroplanes will be entered in the contests, while Mr. Hamilton will bring Curtiss, Wright and Farman biplanes, which he will fly. Big prizes are offered for successful flights and with favorable weather conditions, it is expected some new world's records may be made. The meet will be on the Country Club grounds east of the city. Special rates have been made on the O. R. & F., Southern Pacific and Hill lines from outside points to Portland and return during the progress of the meet, and a large attendance is expected.

A remarkable sale of Oregon fruit lands was that made during the past week when the Burrell orchard, of 605 acres, near Medford in the Rogue River Valley, passed to new owners for the record-breaking figure of \$500,000. Captain Gordon Vorhies, of Portland, sold the property to C. M. Speck and associates, of Spokane. The orchard has a splendid record, returning a fortune each year from its large acreage of apples and pears. It is said a portion of the orchard may be subdivided and sold in small tracts by the new owners.

Hints For Stock Owners.

The air ships are flying high, but they can not overtake pork. The humble pig has become the

most important animal on the farm.

March winds whistle the fleas right off the cows. Keep them out of the cold.

We would not hear so much about Pasteurizing in the creamery if there were a little more pasteurizing in the dairy.

The farm animals are shedding their coats, and the Peter Tumble-down cows will soon show clean flanks for the first time since last fall.

If much chilled, the lamb should be taken at once to a warm room, and plunged in water as hot as the hand will stand.

Then wrap the lamb in hot flannel and rub it dry.

If a ewe loses her lamb, she can be taught to mother a twin by confining her in a narrow stall.

A small quantity of oil-meal is a valued addition to the grain ration at this time.

Keep the pens level and dry.

You can't toughen a horse to the spring work in a day. Start in easy. Think how it is with your own shoulders.

Take pains to exercise the horses and harden them up before the real spring work begins. This is necessary if you wish to avoid delays and risks.

Standing in the barn will spoil a horse sooner than good steady work. When you see his legs begin to stock up, hurry and get him to work at something, if it is nothing more than exercising in the yard every day. Keep that up till you have some real business to do.
