In the Matter of Bids for the Crushing of Rock and Putting It on County Roads.

Sealed bids will be received for the crushing of rock and running it into the bins and hauling the rock on the roads where directed by the supervisor. Bids to be made by the cubic yard for the crushing, and so much by the cubic yard by the mile or one half mile up to five miles for the delivery on the road at McMinnville. And for the other two crushers by the cubic yard for crushing and running into bins. The county will furnish the rock crusher at McMinnville, and with one of the other crushers will furnish an engine, the contractors to furnish everything else except what tools are on hand with each crusher, the rock to be received and measured by a man furnished by the County Court on the road.
