Salem Horse Show.

The Annual Horse Show at Salem will be held Friday and Saturday, April 8th and 9th. This event is one of the most important of its kind to the farmers of the Northwest, where the farmers and stock men can see the best horses of all breeds.

The first day of the Horse Show will be exhibiting the different horses in a magnificent parade. The second day will be devoted to a sale. At this sale buyers and sellers will assemble from all parts of the country, and as the entries of stock are to be printed in catalogue form and sent broadcast, there will be no difficulty in finding buyers for all available horses in the country.

Last year the Salem Horse Show equaled the annual State Fair exhibition. Probably 40,000 people were here to see it. This year it will be better and a larger crowd is expected. Low rate for round-trip tickets are granted by the railroad.

The Horse Show Association, of which C. L. Dick is president and R. L. Paulua is secretary, is a permanent organization, so that this event will be handled in a business like manner from year to year. It is planned to erect a bleacher and a grand stand along the streets, which will be taken down and stored for another season. There is a movement on foot to erect a \$25,000 auditorium in which this event will be held in the future.

The Willamette Valley farmers should attend an exhibition of this kind and give it their hearty support, as it is more largely to their benefit than anyone else's. The exhibition is free and Salem will do her utmost to entertain all in a loyal manner.

Teachers and School Officers Meet at Carlton

Promptly at 10 o'clock Saturday, March 19, the meeting was called to order by Supt. Belt. Several songs were sung by the Carlton pupils, after which Miss Ida Smith, of the McMinnville schools, gave some interesting work on primary reading. Miss Bodle, of the Carlton school, next gave a very instructive exercise in number work.

Prof. Dodson, of Dayton, gave a splendid talk on devices, putting enough humor into his really good advice to keep his audience well entertained until the noon hour.

The dinner was served in the school building by the pupils, and judging from the well cooked viands that were placed on the table, one would think that the Carlton school was conducting a domestic science department.

The afternoon session was opened by a solo rendered by one of the girls of the school. It was thoroughly appreciated by all present. Later we were favored with another solo, which was equally entertaining.

Supt. Belt then discussed various matters of interest to teachers and patrons, and spent a few minutes explaining some features of the coming school fair. He certainly has the interest of the schools at heart, and everyone should aid him to better their condition.

Prof. Ailer, of Carlton, handled the subject of current events in such a manner that one could readily see that his pupils will be kept informed on the important happenings of today.

Prof. Thorpe, of Grand Ronde school, instructed the teachers for the next hour in the work of calisthenics of which he is master.

After some discussion on questions handed in by various persons, the institute adjourned to meet in McMinnville, April 23.

In the Matter of Bids for the Crushing of Rock and Putting It on County Roads.

Sealed bids will be received for the crushing of rock and running it into the bins and hauling the rock on the roads where directed by the supervisor. Bids to be made by the cubic yard for the crushing, and so much by the cubic yard by the mile or one half mile up to five miles for the delivery on the road at McMinnville. And for the other two crushers by the cubic yard for crushing and running into bins. The county will furnish the rock crusher at McMinnville, and with one of the other crushers will furnish an engine, the contractors to furnish everything else except what tools are on hand with each crusher, the rock to be received and measured by a man furnished by the County Court on the road.
