Next Wednesday is the time for the next W. C. T. U. meeting. Mrs. R. W. Everest will conduct a Mother's meeting program after the business session.

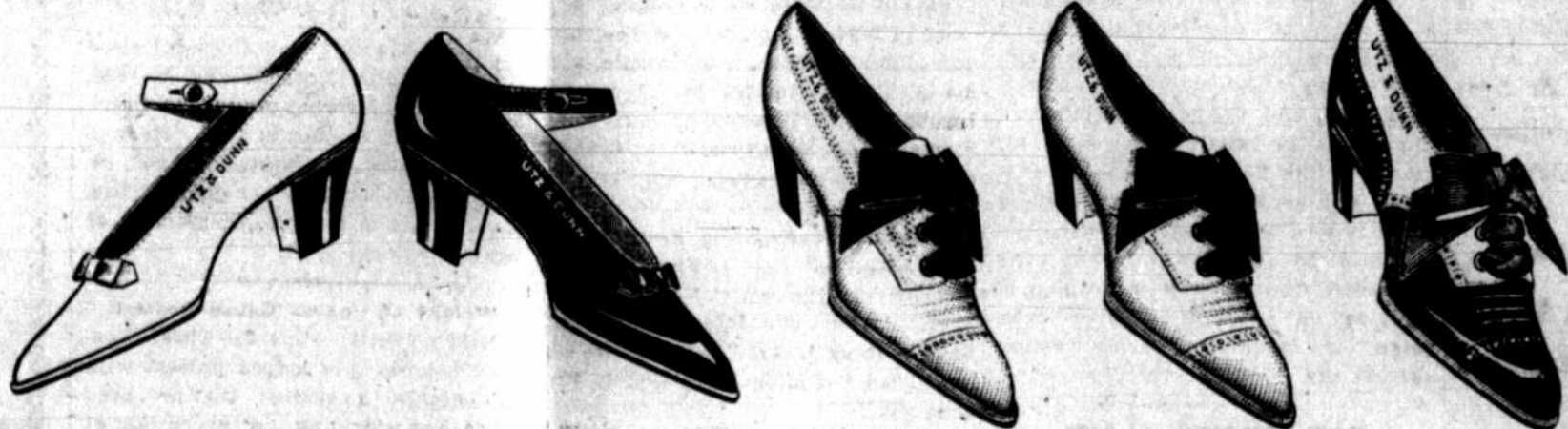
Change in Business Firm.
