The German M. E. Sunday School children rode in state and added their voices in behalf of a dry Oregon in 1910.

One of the biggest floats of the line was from out of town, advertising the Fernwood Athletic Association. Old timers would know where it hailed from were we to say "Skunk Hollow." But the world do move. Skunk Hollow is in bad odor—has already become a tradition—and it is now Fernwood. Some thirty Fernwood lassies announced the fact to the world by a banner which could be read from Dan to Beersheba.

Tastefully decorated individual vehicles were also to be seen and horseback riders, ladies and gentlemen, including some well made-up Indians. Some fine mounts were on parade and none better than those of the chief, F. S. Morris, and his niece, Miss Ethel Morris as Minnehaha.

The whole line of March was thronged with delighted spectators and every prospect seemed to please. The general sentiment was expressed by the man who was heard to say, "I was never more surprised in my life—they just kep' a comin'."

Exercises in College Grove

The parade ended its march at the college grounds. In the oak grove a commodious platform had been erected and before it, sufficient seats placed to seat several hundred people. As many more stood and gave close attention to the morning program. There was music by the band and more "vim, vigor and vitality" from the Veteran fife and drum corps. The invocation was offered by Rev. A. J. Weaver, after which the Declaration of Independence was vigorously delivered by J. Earl Jones. A song and exercise by the children of the L. T. L., under the leadership of Mrs. M. E. C. Scott, followed.

Mayor N. C. Christenson, who presided, presented Hon. B. F. Mulkey, of Medford, as the orator of the day. The address which followed was a model for such an occasion. The historical was covered in the usual and fitting tribute to the Fathers of the Republic and its later defenders. The speaker then launched into an earnest consideration of the present day civic problems confronting us, the solution of which in 1910 calls for the same brand of patriotism as was embodied in the spirit of '76 or '61. In brief, he pleaded for a patriotism that is higher than party, for the guidance of principle rather than prejudice. He deplored the spirit of warfare as manifested by the

armament of nations and closed with a fine peroration in which he pictured the future marshalling of the nations of the earth under the banner of the Prince of Peace. While listening to this magnificent address, the writer could not help comparing it with a pseudo "peace address" delivered here on a similar occasion some few years ago, and smiled. Mr. Mulkey certainly made good.

The Baseball Games

Very early in the afternoon crowds of celebrators stretched clear around the college athletic field, intent on the game of baseball which had been arranged between St. Paul and the Columbia Hardware team of Portland. The latter had administered two defeats this season to St. Paul, but after Monday's matinee, the wonder was, how did they do it. For the half breeds came out with the full determination to return with the scalps of the city pale faces. And they did it without getting scratched themselves, in a score of 4 to 0. For all that it was a good game and the rivalry between the teams made it interesting to watch. Archie Parrett refereed the game.

This engagement was followed by a minor one between the Newberg and St. Paul junior teams. What this game lacked in science was made up in "local color" as there was a home team in action. The visitors took an early lead and it looked like there would be nothing of the doughnut for the Newberg lads but the hole. However they came up from behind and gave their opponents a good run down the homestretch, St. Paul again winning, 14 to 12.

The Newberg players were "Slats" Slater and Hoovey as the battery, John Elliott, "Bugs" Henry, Brissett, Miller, Van Blaricom, Fairbanks and Otis. Dr. Geo. Larkin and F. A. Elliott acted as the indicator men.

The Evening Entertainment

The pleasant evening twilight was made musical by a pleasing concert by the Band and by the virile notes by the fife and drum corps which kept things stirring all day. In an endurance contest there would have been nothing doing for their competitors.

As night drew on, F. A. Morris, as director-general of pyrotechnics, assisted by Nate Stanley, Roy Woods and Tom Higgins as artillery officers and a few subalterns, brought his field pieces into position, and the last engagement of the day was soon on. The bombardment was spectacular and successful, the only casualties reported being a powder-burned and lacerated hand of a volunteer officer who was rushed to the receiving hospital of Dr. Rankin and one non-commissioned officer missing, who has since been accounted for however. Two men had a narrow escape from a bursting mortar but proceeded as if such trifles were not to be thought of on such a day. The display was heartily received and after "Good Night" was flashed from headquarters, a tired but contented people homeward plod its weary way.
