N. H. Shireman, who bought the Chas. Jensen farm on the foot hills about two years ago, for which he paid \$6000 and sold for \$10,000, has traded for a wheat farm near Condon, Eastern Oregon. There is considerable talk of oiling the streets here to keep down the dust and it is probable that it will be done soon.

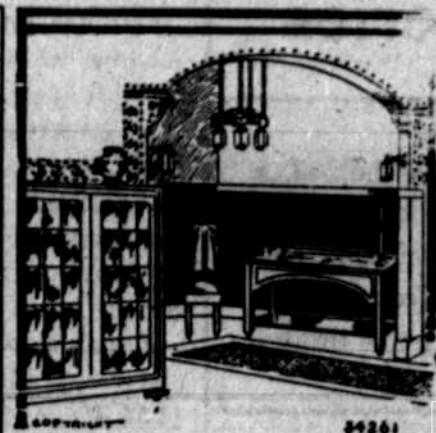
The County Republican Assembly will meet here Saturday to elect delegates to the State Assembly and also recommend candidates for county offices.
