The cover of the August number of the magazine published by the American Christian Missionary Society at Cincinnati, Ohio, the national organ of the Christian Church, is artistically adorned with a picture of Gertrude Aileen Ritchey, the pretty little five-year-old daughter of Pastor and Mrs. Geo. C. Ritchey of this place. The legend beneath her name, reads: "Born May 4th, 1905. Made her first offering to American Christian Missionary Society, May 7th, 1905."

In further explanation, the following is found on a succeeding page: "The sweet child face which adorns the cover of this issue of the American Home Missionary is the youngest contributor to the American Missionary Society. Gertrude is the daughter of our missionary pastor at Newberg, Oregon. Gertrude, Eva and Eloise Loine are three sisters in the home of Brother and Sister Ritchey. All are contributors to Missions. The father writes—I want all my girls to be missionary in spirit and practice, so they give regularly from birth.
