The date is November 30 to December 2. A number of home growers of apples who have been speaking of fine apples produced this season should make good by making exhibits at the "Show," and every man, woman and child about Newberg who is manifesting interest in fruit growing, should at least attend this meeting and rub up against growers who will be present from all over the Northwest. None can fail to receive new inspiration by mingling with such a meeting of enthusiastic horticulturists as attend these annual gatherings.

Mayor Christenson, of Newberg, was not allowed a place on the jury that tried the celebrated Carl Fuchs "near beer" case in the circuit court at McMinnville last week. Everybody knows that Mr. Christenson is a thoroughly conscientious man and one who could be relied on to cast his vote in the jury room in accordance with the law and the evidence in the case, but it is also well known that he does not stand for winking at violations of the local option law, and consequently he was told to step aside. APPLES VERSUS "BOOZE."

Following is the subject matter contained on a leaflet that is being sent broadcast throughout the country by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, of Cook County, Illinois: "The use of apples as an article of diet will very much diminish, decrease and ultimately abate the appetite for alcoholic stimulants. That this is a fact could be proved in many instances if a little care, caution and vigilance be taken to investigate conditions. As a rule, the habitual user of alcoholic stimulants is rarely a consumer of apples. There seems to be a peculiar combination in apples that allays the irritation, or so-called appetite, produced by the use of liquor."

There's a reason for the appearance of this leaflet, a direct and authoritative reason, based upon scientific investigation, so we are told. As the story runs, Dr. Samuel Bailey, of Mount Airy, Ia., has spent time, energy and money on experiments which are said to establish the anti-"booze" utility of the apple. It is stated that Dr. Bailey has cured hundreds of drunkards by feeding them apples. He simply waits until they want "just one more," and then he's there with a nice juicy red one. Persistence along this line finally puts the patient high, dry and permanently on the wagon.

Whether or not this Iowa doctor has really laid a lasting foundation for the campaign that is being carried on by the good women of Cook County we may not determine other than to give the reported facts due credit until they are disproven, if that ever happens. Admittedly, the "booze" victim must find the apple cure to be a pleasant one, and, sectionally speaking, it interests the people of this section, though none of us had ever drunk a drop.

If the drunkenness of the world can be cured by apples, Oregon can supply the crop. If the thirst-quenching quality of the apple cuts any figure, then we say, "Oregon apples against the field for anything that dare

be named." Moreover, it should be pleasing for the apple-growers in the finest apple country in all creation to know that that delicious fruit of the people is at last coming to its own; that it has finally lived down that unenviable reputation acquired some 5000 years ago in that garden on the Euphrates. If the regeneration of those addicted to vice is really to be added to the other virtues of the apple, let the people of Oregon rejoice thereat and consider the matter as more water on their own wheel.—Evening Telegram.
