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SEATTLE MAYOR AND OTHERS TO BE JAILED

Warrants Asked for Chief Executive, Police Chief and Criminals.

Seattle.—More than 1000 warrants for arrests on the charge of misdemeanor, including one for Mayor Hiram C. Gill and one for Chief of Police Wapenstein and all the abandoned women and criminal classes and hangers-on of the restricted district, are asked at the hands of Judge J. T. Ronald, of the Superior Court, by William T. McKenney, who filed his complaint with the sworn statement that he had made similar complaint to Prosecuting Attorney Geo. F. Vandever, who had failed and refused to procure their issuance.

Five hundred Jane Doe and 500 Richard Doe warrants are asked for in addition to one each for Wapenstein and Gill.

The petition and affidavit of Mr. McKenney recited the Murphy injunction proceedings and charges that the defendants refused to obey the terms of the court order. The law relating to nuisances is quoted, providing that gambling, fighting, prostitution, offenses against decency and omissions of duty are misdemeanors under the law and that the defendants are plainly guilty of misdemeanors. The names of witnesses who can attest to this statement of fact are given in the petition.

Judge Ronald was asked for the warrants last Saturday evening, but refused at that time because of defects in the papers. These have now been corrected in accordance with his objections, and the petitioner anticipates no difficulty in procuring an order for the arrest of the parties.

These proceedings are separate and distinct from the contempt of court proceedings instituted against practically the same defendants, and which an order to show cause has been issued, returnable on Friday.

WELLMAN IS UNDAUNTED.

Aeronaut Ready to Try Flight of Atlantic Once More.

Atlantic City.—Walter Wellman and the five men who attempted to cross the Atlantic in a dirigible balloon were given an enthusiastic welcome on their arrival here. While he made no definite announcement concerning

his acceptance of the offer of the hotel men who backed the America enterprise, Wellman, as well as the other men who made the trip, declared they were ready to try the hazardous voyage again in a specially constructed dirigible.

DR. CRIPPEN FOUND GUILTY

London.—After a trial lasting only five days and a deliberation by the jury of only 24 minutes, Dr. Hawley H. Crippen was found guilty of the murder of his wife, well known as an actress under the name of Belle Elmore, and Crippen was sentenced to be hanged. The execution will take place in all probability on either November 14 or November 15. The speed with which the case was considered was characteristic of British procedure.

Abolish Insurance Graft.

Olympia, Wash.—John H. Schively, state insurance commissioner, in a letter to Governor Hay, which the Governor has indorsed and forwarded to Chairman J. D. Bassett, of the State Insurance Code Commission, recommends that Washington abolish the "state graft" of charging insurance companies for the examination of their books.

King of Siam Is Dead.

Bangkok.—The death of King Chulalong, which occurred at an early hour Sunday morning, was due to uraemic poisoning. The King had suffered for years from nephritis.

NEWS OF NOTED PERSONS

David Bennett Hill, the noted New York democratic politician, recently died at the age of 67.

Former Senator Foraker, in opening the republican campaign at Louisville, Ky., denounced the New Nationalism of Theodore Roosevelt as "treasonable as secession itself."

Sarah Bernhardt sailed on the steamer Provence from Havre to tour America.

Marvin Hughitt, for nearly 24 years president of the Chicago & Northwestern railway, gave up that position to become chairman of the board of directors.

Edgar Allen Poe is at last in the Hall of Fame. Years of effort on the part of staunch supporters to have his name added to the list have been rewarded.

A gift from J. P. Morgan of \$100,000 to the campaign fund for the world's conference on church unity served as a fitting climax to the greatest convention in the history of the Protestant Episcopal church at Cincinnati.

Mrs. Frances Folsom Cleveland, widow of President Cleveland, has been named by Governor Fort, of New Jersey, as one of the commissioners to manage the Women's Reformatory in that state.

WASHINGTON, D. C., NOTES

Reorganization of the San Francisco immigration station, with the retirement from office of Commissioner Hart North, is contemplated in a recommendation now being considered by Secretary Nagel.

The positive statement is made at the White House that President Taft will not name the new court of commerce until the reconvening of congress.

An enormous reserve army of from 90,000 to 110,000 men to supplant the present fighting force of the regulars and militia is planned by Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff, and other officers of the war college.

The interstate commerce commission has under consideration the question of setting a definite date when rates under the so-called intermountain and coast cases shall go into effect on eastbound and westbound traffic.

Seventy-seven men heroically gave their lives in efforts to subdue the forest fires in the west, during the latter part of August, according to figures given out by the forest service. These were mostly temporary employees engaged for the purpose of fighting the fires.

Contributions of \$1,000,000 for a world-wide expansion of the Young Men's Christian Association, \$450,000 of which was given by John D. Rockefeller, were announced at the conference of Young Men's Christian Association workers in the White House. President Taft addressed the delegates and heartily indorsed the organization.

BRIEF NEWS OF THE WEEK

Federal Judge McCall at Memphis, issued a writ of injunction against 113 saloons, debaring them from selling intoxicating liquors.

The republican state central committee of Iowa formally declined the proposal of the democratic central committee for an informal senatorial primary on November 8 to select candidates for a successor to Senator Dooliver.

It has been announced that scores of big American importers have confessed to Collector Loeb that they have undervalued goods brought into this country. Loeb says the government will recover at least \$1,000,000 from these importers.

Indicted four years ago on 1528 counts, the Standard Oil company of Indiana put in its defense in the term of the Federal court which met Monday at Jackson, Tenn., to charges of accepting concessions amounting to rebates which, if proved, would involve a maximum fine of \$20,480,000.

One of the most notable gatherings of the week will be the thirty-seventh international convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of America at Toronto on Thursday. The convention will be attended by over 2,000 delegates, representing 500,000 members of the Y. M. C. A. in the United States and Canada.

In the presence of cheering thousands the largest steamship in the world was launched at Belfast, Ireland. She is the Olympic of the White Star line. The Olympic exceeds by nearly 100 feet in length and 13,000 tons any other ship afloat.

May Involve Labor Leaders.

Los Angeles.—Certainly three and possibly four of the labor leaders of the Coast will be indicted by the special grand jury, according to the positive statements of officials who will put in the evidence. They are said to be entangled in several different directions, and the evidence of the alleged criminal knowledge of the plot to dynamite the times building is regarded as conclusive.

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
