Attention of Employees and Employers.

The ballot which will be submitted for your consideration on election day, November 8th, will present among other initiative and referendum measures, an employers' liability bill, being No. 330, which we think should be defeated for the following reasons:

FIRST. It requires all owners

of property, contractors, or their agents engaged in the construction of buildings, manufacturers, users of machinery, to have all materials inspected and tested, which would be an unfair burden and physically impossible.

SECOND. Section 1 of the proposed bill applies in its application to contractors, every owner of property, including farmers with the exception of those whose operations are limited to a private dwelling or barn, but would include the operation of machinery or construction of silos, dairies, or plants where electricity is a factor.

THIRD. It holds that any foreman, superintendent or other person in charge of any department of the employer's operations shall be deemed his agent, and the employer will be held accountable for any negligence of said agent. Furthermore, there is no limit (limited now to \$7,500.00) as to the amount of damages that said employers could be held responsible for, which simply means financial ruin for many small operators throughout the state.

FOURTH. Under all conditions, employers of every description are held responsible for accidents due to the negligence of a fellow employee. Furthermore, if an accident is due to the negligence of the employee himself, the employer in denied the right to plead this as an absolute defense.

FIFTH. WHENEVER ANY PERSON IS CONVICTED OF VIOLATING ANY PORTION OF THE PROPOSED ACT HE IS PUNISHABLE BY FINE OR TERM IN PRISON, OR BOTH, IN THE DISCRETION OF THE COURT, AND IN ADDITION, SUBJECT TO DAMAGES AS WELL IN A CIVIL SUIT.

This clause is certainly most radical in its application and if carried out literally, would be a most objectionable feature and bankrupt many employers of limited resources.

The employers are in favor of any legislation which will safeguard the interests of employees and which will be in keeping with legislation now being adopted by other states who have given a great deal of thought and consideration to this subject. We are inclined to favor the adoption of a law similar to the one passed by the New York legislature, or one proposed by the commission appointed by the governor of Minnesota, and with that end in view we would recommend the passage of bill No. 346, which provides for a commission of representative and honest citizens from every position in life who will thoroughly investigate the subject and recommend a bill to the legislature for passage which we believe will be more beneficial to the employees and fair to employers. The measure which has been passed by the New York state legislature provides for specific damages for loss of life and limb as well as fixed indemnity for total or partial disability, and will do away with the intervention of ambulance chasing attorneys. Any legislation that is passed should minimize as much as possible litigation, and bill No. 330, if passed, will increase litigation and lessen the amount of damages which would otherwise be available under an arbitrary compensation bill providing fixed amounts for damages, on account of various kinds of injuries sustained.

Bill No. 330, if passed, will place all employers in this state under a tax on business which other industries of similar character located in other states will not be compelled to carry, and will consequently restrict the operations of all employers in this state owing to their inability to compete with their competitors more advantageously located in adjoining states. This will be the cause of capital being invested elsewhere and also this will result in the less number of men being employed and directly affecting the working man.

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
