Andrew, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. Winslow, died on Monday afternoon of typhoid pneumonia, after a short illness, aged eighteen years. Funeral services, conducted by Rev. A. J. Weaver, were held at the Friends church on Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. W. W. Nelson has completed the work of taking the school census for the Newberg district, No. 29, and reports a total of 1038 children who will draw school money, 799 of whom reside within the city limits and 239 outside the city.

S. W. Potter, the jeweler, has new plate glass windows in his store room and all changes made in the interior, and is now displaying his goods to a much better advantage. Without any great outlay of money he has converted a very ordinary store front into one that is attractive, and much more likely to catch the eye of prospective buyers. It has been money well spent.

John Groff loaded a car with 1,100 young fir trees of the right size and proportions for Christmas trees a few days ago, and started the car for Los Angeles by fast freight. He and Mrs. Groff will follow the car and will be in the city of Angels to look after the sale of the trees. The young Oregon fir makes about the prettiest Christmas tree that grows, and the Californians ought to appreciate this shipment.

John Hunt, aged nearly sixteen years, died at the home of Mr. Woodruff, on Dayton avenue at an early hour on last Monday morning of bowel trouble, after an illness of very short duration. He came here with his father, Dr. A. T. Hunt, from Westfield, Indiana, a month or more ago, and they had been spending the time looking about for a location, with the view of sending for the rest of the family a little later when they got located. Dr. Hunt was in Portland when the son was taken sick. He left for Westfield with the remains on Tuesday morning's train.

J. E. Combest and J. P. Laplant have bought the interest of Wesley Boyes in the meat market. David Boyes retains a third interest. The name will be "The Palace Meat Market."

R. B. Jacks has sold his confectionery business to E. O. Van-Osdol and will take a long needed outdoor rest. About the first of the year he says he intends to take to the hills where he can get close to nature and breathe the pure fresh air.

The city council has made a sale of sewer bonds to the amount of \$80,000, to Morris Bros., of Portland, the same to run twenty years, the rate of interest being 5 per cent., payable semi-annually. The estimate of the engineer is that this sum will be sufficient to pay for a sewer system to cover the entire town.

Wm. Huston died at his home near the brick factory at ten o'clock Wednesday night, leaving a widow and two children. While working at the brick factory some time ago he fell and broke two ribs and was otherwise badly bruised up. Before recovering from his injuries he took pneumonia from which he failed to rally.

The United States National Bank has sold the old bank building located on the corner of First and Meridian streets to D. A. Hart who comes from Gresham. We understand Mr. Hart intends to put in a stock of hardware and will probably also handle farm machinery and vehicles. J. F. Taylor will continue to occupy the corner room with his seed and feed business.

Postmaster C. B. Wilson furnishes the figures to show that the Newberg postoffice is making steady gains in business from year to year. Taking the month of November for the past five years as a basis, the increase may be noted. The postal receipts for November 1906 were \$284.29, for the same month in 1907 \$359.22, for 1908 \$441.66, for 1909 \$625.82 and for 1910 \$736.10, making a gain of 160 per cent in five years. Since the business a postoffice does is a pretty fair indication of the progress a town or city is making, the above figures speak well for Newberg.

"Got His Goat."

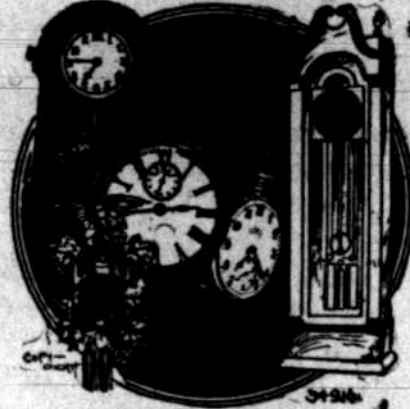

Notice to Owners of Stock.

Notice is hereby given that at a general election held November 8th, 1910, a majority of votes was cast against stock running at large in West Chehalis precinct, Yamhill County, Oregon, under penalty of ten dollars for the first offense and twenty dollars for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the stock in a civil action in the name of the State of Oregon, before a Justice of the Peace of the precinct in which such person or keeper, or either of them, may reside, and such penalty shall be for the benefit and when collected paid into the Common School fund of the county in which such action is brought, within sixty days after such animal is proven to be at

large. This law goes into effect sixty days from date of this notice.
