Purdy seems to be laboring under the impression that the Butteville bridge boosters have a prior claim on the attention of the people on the bridge proposition, but the fact remains that Newberg has been canvassing the matter of bridging the Willamette at this point for several years and has never abandoned the idea of making it a reality. There is no likelihood of the Butteville people being able to interest the county court of Yamhill in their proposition, as there are very few people in this county who are interested in seeing a bridge built at that point. At Newberg it is different for here a thickly populated district outside of Newberg would have easy access to the bridge when they wanted to cross to the other side of the river. See to it that your name is on the petition addressed to the county court in behalf of a bridge at Newberg.

UP TO THE LEGISLATURE.

Oregon has travelled in the mud long enough. The wheels of the state's progress have been too frequently sunk in the holes of our roads. The thinking men have read the signs of the times. We must build our roads better. The men who are building our railroads and developing our industries anxiously wait the expression of Oregon's people in this matter of road building. Complete development of resources without good roads to aid transportation is impossible. The seeming lethargy of Oregon people in the matter of road building can no longer be excused on the ground that the constitution will not permit pledging of the county's credit for permanent road making. The good roads amendment so strongly approved at the last election, removed this bar.

Now to make this amendment operative, five good roads measures are to go before the legislature. They provide for the creation of a State Highway com-

mission of three members whose executive officer shall be the State Highway commissioner. The obligation of the commissioner will be to help build roads and help operate the road building system we have lacked. This is the most important of the bills because it promises to result in actual road building. The bills for the use of convicts in state and county prisons will, when adopted have the effect of making men who before have been merely a burden, assistants, even if unwilling, in state and county development. The State Aid bill, which causes the state to pay one-third and the county two-thirds of the cost of permanent roads, will take a material burden from the counties, while the bonding act will not only make operative the recently approved good roads amendment, but will furnish means for each county to raise road-making cash.

All of these bills should be well considered by our legislators. Their provisions should be well understood. Their defects, if any should be corrected. But above all, our lawmakers should remember that the people have spoken decisively in favor of good roads at the polls and by the wide representation at the recent good roads convention in Portland. We need system in road building. The evidence of the need for good roads is emphasized in the popular demand for them. The good roads measures evidently are aimed to meet this need and for this reason merit support.—Eugene Register.

WOMANLY WISDOM.

The fastest flying machine is gossip.

There is always room on the sunny side of the road; let us walk there.

It is an easy matter to size up a man if his dog crawls under the house when it sees him approaching.

Sifted coal ashes, mixed with a little vinegar, make a splendid mixture for polishing faucets, brass kettles and the like.

Tack pieces of rubber, cut from overshoes, to the bottom of the step-ladder legs, and they will not slide on a slippery floor.

Whenever a bottle has been emptied, wash it right out, and do not set it away to dry. You can clean it more easily by doing this.

The cork in a bottle of cement or glue is apt to stick and break when it is opened for the second time. To prevent this, grease it lightly when first taken out.

If housewives would have rubber heels and soles on their everyday shoes, they would find that much discomfort from aching, tired feet would be avoided.

It saves much hard work in keeping heavy bedclothes tidy under the usage they ordinarily receive from the boys and hired men, to have a breadth of muslin or calico firmly basted over the

upper end of quilts and bed comforters. This can be removed often and washed with much less work than to put the whole big comforter in the tub.

Cabbage is more delicate if, after it is boiled a little while, it is turned out into a colander and cold water run over it; then put again in boiling water and finished.

After boiling salt ham or tongue, remove it from the fire and plunge it at once in cold water. This instantly loosens the skin, which then pulls off without any trouble.

Save the good pieces of the men's winter underclothes. From them you can make the children some shirts, drawers or petticoats that will be as warm and last nearly as long as new. Saves money, too.

Have buttons, or hooks and eyes, for the slips you use on the sofa-pillows. Then you can often take the pillows out and wash the slips. Saves a lot of sewing and the slips are apt to get washed a good deal oftener.

A handy funnel for pouring liquid into a bottle may be quickly made anywhere by taking a piece of thick, smooth white paper, rolling it into a cornucopia and fastening it with a pin. Cut the pointed end off and it's ready to use.

When any one is taken ill in the night and needs a quick application of heat, light a lamp. The chimney will be hot in a moment and will answer until water or a brick can be heated. It can be slipped into a stocking leg and applied at once.

Knit the baby's mittens without any thumb; then, no matter which way they are put on, they are all right. If large enough he can move his fingers all around inside, while the long wrists keep the sleeves of his dress down over his arms and make him comfortable.

Light and wholesome griddle-cakes: Pare the crust from a stale loaf of baker's or light home-made bread, crumb it into a porcelain dish and pour over it a pint of boiling milk. Cover and let it stand for ten minutes. When it swells add the yolk of two eggs, well beaten, a tablespoonful of melted butter, a half-teaspoonful of salt, a fourth of a cupful of sifted flour and the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Then beat until the batter is smooth and velvety as cream. Add no baking powder, as the beating makes it light. Drop it in little cakes on a hot griddle; bake quickly.
