NOTES FROM PACIFIC COLLEGE

The college defeated the Newberg amateurs last Friday evening 28-12.

Many students are nursing colds and sore throats as the result of the snow.

In one of the fastest practice games of the season the college defeated the high school at their gym Monday afternoon, score 20-17. The line up for the college was Lewis and Parker, forwards; Pearson, center; Benson and Armstrong, guards. High school, Miller and Larkin, forwards; Henry, center; Hollingsworth and Fendall, guards.

The college Freshmen and the Senior Preps took advantage of the snow and had coasting in the vicinity of Springbrook.

Last Wednesday and Thursday Hervy F. Smith, Vice President and Traveling Secretary for the Pacific Coast of the Intercollegiate Prohibition Association, was in town looking after the interests of the Association at Pacific College.

There is considerable interest shown in the work here, owing to the fact that the first National Oratorical Contest of the Association was won by Walter R. Miles of Pacific College. Virgil G. Hinchshaw, president of the association, is a graduate of Penn college and is quite well known here. He is located at Portland at present.

The work at Pacific college is being taken up in a new and practical way, this year. The faculty has decided to offer a regular course in the study of the liquor question. This course will be under Professor Brissenden, and will likely meet twice a week, college credit being given for the work done. By this plan any student interested in the liquor question will have the opportunity to take a practical and systematic study in the question.

The College Prohibition Movement is now organized in twenty-five states and in nearly two hundred colleges and universities. It conducts the largest series of oratorical contests in the world, every oration being on some phase of the liquor problem, 700 orations having been written and delivered in the past two years, and over \$4,000 given in prizes. Pacific College expects to have an orator in the Oregon State Prohibition contest to be held at Dallas college in March.

Mr. Smith goes from here to McMinnville college. Then to Dallas college, Oregon Agricultural College, Philomath College, Albany College, Willamette University and Pacific University.

He has already visited the colleges of California, Washington and Idaho.

About twenty-five colleges are organized on the coast. The Western Interstate Contest will be held this year at Los Angeles about May 1.

NEWBERG HIGH SCHOOL WINS FROM CORVALLIS

In a lively game of basketball played here Saturday night, the Newberg high school team easily out-classed the Corvallis team. The visitors were somewhat handicapped over the loss of two or three men, but manifested much pluck and took their defeat gracefully. The usual student body enthusiasm was well displayed in song and yell under the able leadership of Prof. Fulkerson. The score was Corvallis High, 15; Newberg High, 27.
