Ferguson and Margaret Caldwell, of Newberg, and Ray B. Ferguson, of LaFayette, besides a large number of other relatives and friends. A large procession accompanied the sorrowing family to LaFayette on Saturday, the interment being made there, following funeral services at the LaFayette Methodist Church.

J. C. COMIC, DECEASED

After spending four weeks in the St. Vincent Hospital in Portland, J. C. Comic died of bladder

trouble on Sunday, April 2.

The deceased was born, August 2, 1844, in the town of Dramor, county of Down, Ireland. At the age of seventeen years he came to America, settling at Mendon, Michigan, where he lived until the Fall of 1895 when he came to Newberg, Oregon, where he resided up to the time of his death.

On February 23, 1880 he united in marriage with Estell Whitman who survives him. To this union four children were born, namely Mrs. Roy Wassam, of Salem, Mrs. James Walsh, of Willamina, Mary Comic and Willie who died six years ago. Deceased had been a member of the Maconic order for 40 years.

Interment was made Tuesday, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. F. C. Stannard.

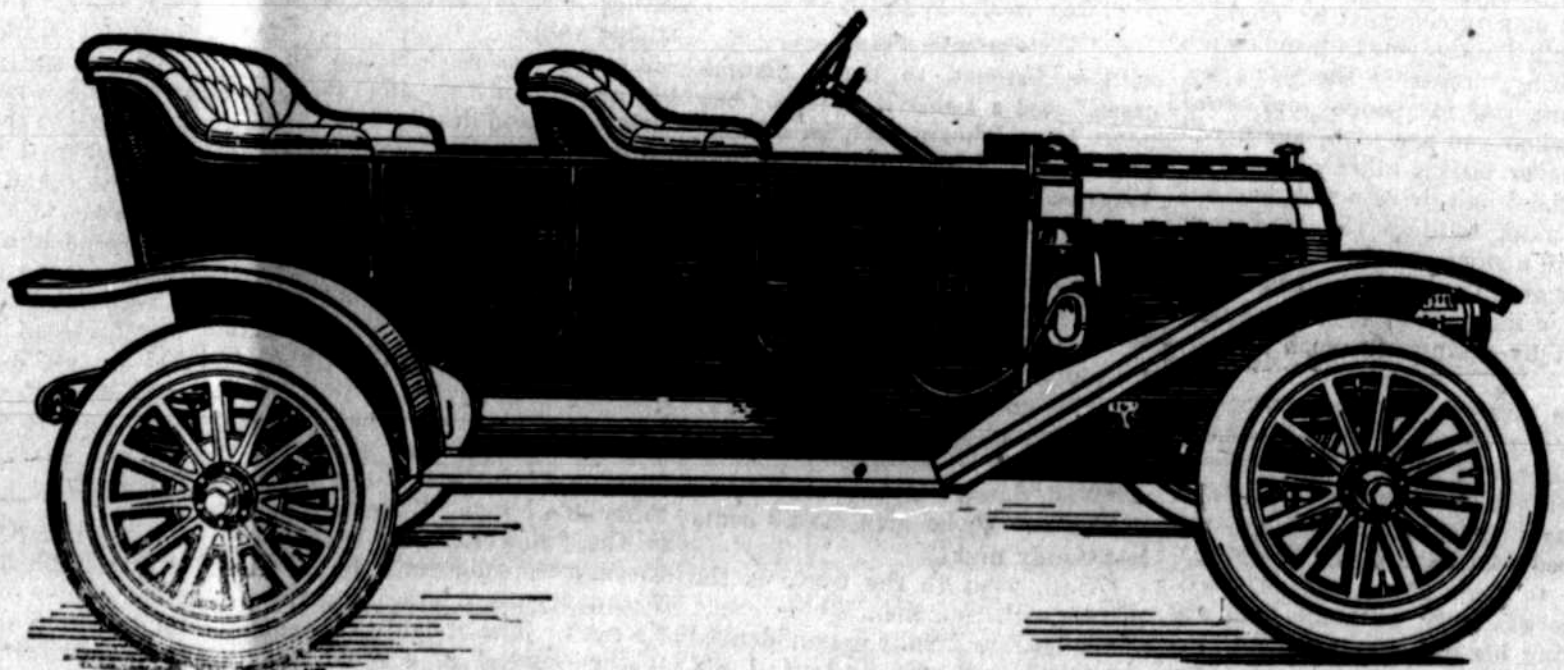
