Haines Burgess of the class of 1909, Pacific College, who is teaching at Sprague, Washington, receives the following favorable mention by the Evergreen: And yet another W. S. C. student has received honor from an eastern college. Mr. E. H. Burgess of the '10 class has been awarded a scholarship in Economics for next year in the State University of Pennsylvania. The University of Pennsylvania ranks with the leading universities of the east, and is on a par with Harvard and Columbia, especially in its Economic and Law courses. The privilege of taking advanced work in such an institution is an opportunity indeed. Mr. Burgess holds the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Pacific College, Oregon, and of Bachelor of Science and Economics from Washington State College. He was graduated in the 1910 class and will be especially remembered as winner of the interclass and intercollegiate Oratorical contests last year. During the past year he has been instructor in History and principal of the High School in Sprague, Wash. Mr. Burgess was graduated with high honor from W. S. C. and without doubt will uphold his own reputation and the reputation of the Alma Mater in his work at the University of Pennsylvania.

W. E. PURDY LETTER

In Which He Says He is Wrongfully Accused.

To the Citizens of Newberg and Yamhill Co., Oregon. Through the Newberg Graphic let me state that a few of my enemies who have been working underhandedly to try to down me, are whispering, on the quiet, that I have been sued for robbing a poor woman, out of property valued at one thousand dollars at a reasonable figure, and that they know this to be a fact etc, etc. Now the facts are these and I promise to substantiate my statement as made here. Two attorneys, of Portland, are trying to blackmail me and get a large sum of money from me for nothing and this is their way and mode of doing business, working up a sentiment against me and no matter what my case is to be, beat me when we come to trial. They make these charges against me:—

Comes now the plaintiff and for her cause of action against the defendant, alleges:

1st. That on or about the 1st day of May, 1909, plaintiff was the owner in fee simple and in her own separate right of the following described real estate in Morrow county, in the State of Oregon; to wit, lots one (1) and two (2) in block eleven (11); lots three (3) and four (4) in block four (4) and lots six (6) in block three (3) all in the town of Castle Rock in the county of Morrow, in the state of Oregon which said real estate was of the reasonable value of \$1,000.

2nd. That on or about the 1st day of May, 1909, plaintiff employed the defendant, for a good and valuable consideration, to sell or otherwise dispose of said real estate for plaintiff and for his services to be performed paid defendant the sum of \$25, that thereupon plaintiff executed a good and sufficient warranty deed to said real estate without naming therein any grantee, leaving the same so that defendant could fill in the name of any grantee that he might or should sell said real estate for not less than \$1,000 and any greater sum he could obtain or to trade the same for other real estate of a value of not less than \$1000 and to immediately account to her for the proceeds he should receive for the same, and with the further instruction that in the event he should trade or exchange said real estate for other real estate, that any conveyance of such real estate he should accept in exchange therefore should be accompanied by an abstract of title, showing a good and sufficient title in any such grantee, and to be subject to the approval of the plaintiff.

3rd. That a short time after the plaintiff employed defendant as aforesaid and delivered said deed to him, defendant sold lots to one J. S. O. Wilson for the sum of \$1000 and filled in the name of the said J. S. O. Wilson as grantee in said deed, and delivered the same to the said Wilson and that said deed was afterwards recorded in the office of the County Clerk of Morrow County, State of Oregon, and is now of record of said county.

4th. That the said defendant received said \$1000 from said Wilson for said real estate and instead of fulfilling his said trust has in all and every respect and in each and every particular failed, refused and neglected to do so and particularly has said defendant converted the said proceeds received from the sale of

said real estate to his own use and benefit and has never in any manner accounted to the plaintiff for the proceeds he received from the said sale of said real estate, and refused and now refuses so to do,—to her damages in the full and just sum of \$1000. Wherefore plaintiff demands judgement against the defendant for the sum of \$1000 and for her costs and disbursements herein. Attorneys for plaintiff. The real facts are, these five lots are not worth over \$50 and everybody who knows where Castle Rock, Morrow Co., Oregon is, knows that lots are not worth more than \$10 each and that they were never assessed for more than \$5 each, then these lots are from a tax title and 25x100 in size. This woman did not own these lots in her own name as stated. They belonged to her husband and her jointly as per recorded deed thereof. I never sold these lots to J. S. O. Wilson for her neither did I get one thousand dollars from him or any sum whatsoever nor from any body else for these lots, neither did this woman pay me one cent for making the said deal as she in this charge states, neither have I one dollar of her money from the sale of the said lots, nor did I ever have. The facts are these. She listed these 5 lots for \$50 with the Will E. Purdy Investment Co. and giving a power of authority in writing to trade these lots for a certain property in Salinas city said change to be made unsight and unseen, without abstract, for better or worse and she was to pay \$50 difference in the trade and I believe now that she made the best deal and had she paid the \$50 and took her deed she could have made three or four times more than the lots were worth. I call upon everybody to look up the value of lots at Castle Rock, Morrow Co., Oregon, (not Castle Rock, Wash.) and by doing so you will plainly see what these attorneys are trying to do. This woman got just what she and her husband traded for. Then when this woman came out to my farm on March 21st, 1910, about seven months after the trade had been made and got her deed I offered there and then to give her what she had listed her lots at for the deed back, but she said she had a deal on and would make more out of the Salinas property than the lots were worth and more than I offered her and was satisfied with our deal.

TOBACCO AND KEROSENE TO KILL PESTS

"There may be any number of efficient contact (or external) insecticides, but the tobacco compounds and kerosene emulsion are inferior to none in their killing properties," says H. F. Wilson of the entomology department of the Oregon Agricultural College, discussing garden pests and methods of getting rid of them.

"Black-Leaf, or Black-Leaf 40, are tobacco compounds made by the Kentucky Tobacco Product company of Louisville, Ky. Printed directions for use are given on each can. The kerosene emulsion is usually prepared as a stock solution and then diluted to the required strength for spraying. The proportions are half a pound of hard soap to a gallon of water and two of kerosene.

"The soap should be dissolved in boiling water, and the kerosene added after removing the container from the fire. The mixture should then be thoroughly agitated until it is a creamy white. This is best done by using a hand-pump, forcing the mixture through the hose and back into the container. This makes three gallons of stock solution which can be diluted to the required strength by adding given amounts of water. To find the amount of water necessary to add to each three gallons of stock solution for a given percentage, one should divide that percentage into two hundred and subtract three from the result. For example, for a 15 per cent solution: 15 is in 200 13 1-3 times; subtracting 3 we have 10 1-3, the number of gallons of water to be added to 3 gallons of stock for a 15 per cent solution. In the same way we find a 20 per cent solution requires 7 gallons of water; a 7 per cent solution 2 1/2 gallons of water."
