CASH PRIZE FOR CLAUDE NEWLIN

In the early part of the school year some well-to-do members of the Friends church in Philadelphia, offered cash prizes for papers written on subjects that have to do with the history of the church during the time of George Fox, the founder of the church. The different Friends Colleges over the country were informed that the competition was open to any of the students of these institutions who might desire to enter.

Claude Newlin, a senior in Pacific College this year, made a selection of books which the Philadelphia people offered to furnish free, and took up a course of reading which he followed closely during the year at every spare moment. He finished his paper just in time to get it in within the time limit which was the first of June. On last Sunday morning he received a letter from Isaac Sharpless, president of Haverford College, stating that he had been awarded first prize of \$70.

This is a great victory for Mr. Newlin and Pacific College, since his paper was in competition with others coming from the older Colleges maintained by the church, while he represents one of the smallest of the number.

The second prize of \$30 went to a student of Penn College, Oskaloosa, Iowa.

Mr. Newlin's subject was "George Fox and Mysticism."
