King's Arm a Measure Standard.

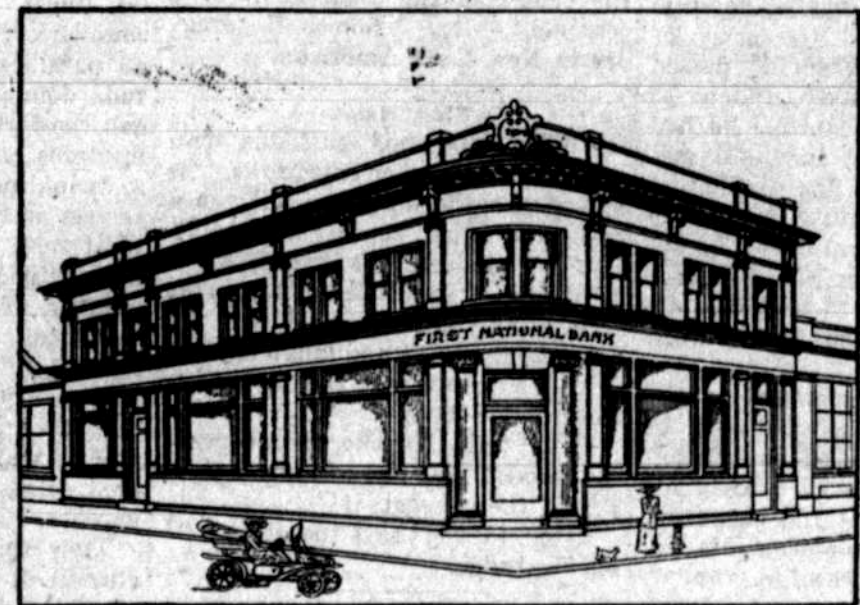
