GRADUATES IN MUSIC

Miss Johnson Completes the Course at O. A. C.

The Corvallis Gazette Times gives the following account of the graduation in music of the daughter of our former townsman, A. P. Johnson.

Miss Queen Inez Johnson, soprano student in the O. A. C. School of Music, appeared at the gymnasium last night in her graduation recital. In a dignified program, including numbers ranging from the lightest to the heavy operatic and oratorio selections, seldom attempted by any but the greater artists, Miss Johnson gave evidence of her ability. While nature has endowed some more generously, it can scarcely be said that many have done more with the gift of the Gods than she. In three years Miss Johnson has completed the work that others find difficult to accomplish in four years and the program, designed to demonstrate her knowledge of vocalization and capacity to meet any demand made on the soprano, rather than as a bid for popular favor, fulfilled its purpose admirably. Miss Johnson rose to every expectation, and to those who understand vocal technique sufficiently well to know what may be reasonably expected, her work last night was superlative. She covered herself with glory and reflected credit upon the O. A. C. School of Music. In the lighter numbers Miss Johnson sang with an intelligent appreciation of their meaning and with a phrasing and expression that was admirable. In the heavy numbers she sang with more volume than one would think possible, and met the demands with an assurance and ability that aroused sincere admiration. Her success dated particularly from "The Jewel Song" from "Faust." This and "Hear Ye Israel," from Elijah, were vocalized to superb effect and only as one with more than commonplace ability could do them. The Schubert group of songs were very pleasing, as well as ably done.

Miss Johnson was warmly applauded, was the recipient of many beautiful floral tokens, and by Prof. W. F. Gaskins,

head of the school of music, was presented with a medal appropriately engraved. The young lady is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Johnson, of this city, is just budding into womanhood and is one whose pleasing personality has made her a favorite. She is studious, persistent, untiring in her work and has justly earned the recognition accorded her last night. Miss Johnson has an ability and a reliance that make her especially fitted for a teacher and it is not improbable that as she continues her studies she will also teach. Her example might well be emulated by many other young women of this vicinity.

In the recital last night Miss Johnson was assisted by a younger sister, Miss Lillian Johnson, and was accompanied by Genevieve Baum Gaskins, who added much to the pleasure of the program.
