IMPROVEMENTS AT HOT LAKE

Despite the fact that various newspapers and news associations throughout the West have attempted by the use of printer's ink to close the Hot Lake Sanatorium, the place continues to do business at the old stand, and improvements are constantly being made. At present a force of men are

engaged in laying a new steel six inch water main from the present pumping plant to the 130,000 gallon cement reservoir, and engineers are doing the location work for the construction of a gravity water system. This means that several small springs which for years have been allowed to go unharnessed, will be brought to the sanatorium and made to furnish water for that institution.

Another mineral spring is also being connected with the main building, and a handsome fountain will be installed in the beautiful office lobby.

Business at the Hot Lake Sanatorium never ceased for one moment. No receiver was appointed, neither is there any possibility of Hot Lake Sanatorium closing its doors. Patients will receive the same kindly care and attention in the future as in the past, and Hot Lake water and mud will continue to relieve suffering humanity.
