FEEDING THE CHILDREN.

Building Up Diet Recommended by a New York Physician.

Parents of young and growing children will study with interest the following possible solution of the problem of what to feed them on, prepared by Dr. E. M. Sill, a New York physician, for the Medical Record.

Dr. Sill suggests this schedule in compiling a diet for both healthy and malnourished children: One-half hour for breakfast, 7 to 8 a. m.—glass of milk, baked apple or orange; cereals—oatmeal, cracked wheat, farina, hominy, etc.; two to three tablespoonfuls of one of these cereals, with cream and milk; eggs, one to three, according to the age of the child, either soft boiled, scrambled or poached or in the form of an omelet, or a lamb chop or fish for variety occasionally; one to three slices of bread three-eighths of an inch thick, with butter.

Ten a. m., an apple, a banana, a couple of graham crackers or a small glass of milk; one hour for dinner, 12 to 1 p. m.—soup, bread and butter; meats—rare steak, rare roast beef, mutton or chicken (fish may be given once a week). From one-eighth to one-fourth of a pound of meat should be given, according to the age and capacity of the child. Baked or boiled potatoes, with butter and salt or stewed with milk, and a green vegetable, such as spinach, carrots, string beans, green peas, cauliflower, squash, a puree of dried soy beans or dried peas, may be given three or four times a week at this meal, or baked beans may be given, one to two tablespoonfuls, and this will in a measure take the place of meat; a glass of milk. Hominy or rice may be given three or four times a week (two to three tablespoonfuls); a simple dessert, such as plain rice pudding, plain bread pudding, custard, blanc-mange, ice cream.

At 4 p. m. an apple, peach or pear may be given if the child is hungry. Half an hour should be taken for supper, at from 6 to 7 p. m.—bread and butter and a glass of milk, or bread and milk, milk with one of the cereals, bread and butter with jelly, fruit juice or sirup, a bit of cold meat or omelet or scrambled eggs.

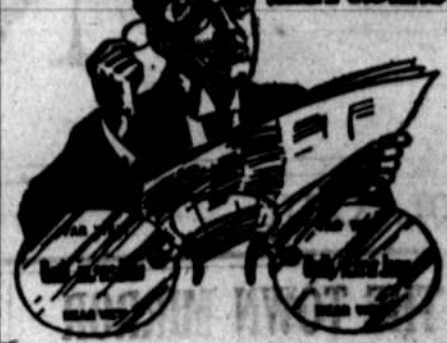

THE AMERICAN WOMAN'S LEAGUE

The Oregon Journal was laid on my table July 21, open at column headed "Receiver named for Lewis firms. Court says it Bill if true fraud one of the greatest of the day." Perhaps it would be well to take that small but all important word "it" into account before we pass judgement. Also we might with advantage recall statements which appeared recently in the press. Here are some extracts "lest we forget."

"Lewis was indicted in 1905 on charges of conducting a scheme to defraud through his operation of the People's United States Bank, etc. *** He was acquitted on several of these charges and all were dismissed later by the Government." (Oregonian July 13.) Indictments are not always condemnations. Later, suits were filed by the Bank and Lewis Publishing Co. against both the postal officials and the Post Dispatch. The postal officials immediately sought protection by claiming that as revenue officers they were immune and could not be sued. For nearly three years Judge McPherson has held the cases under advisement, but on July 8th he handed down his decision against them. A prompt trial will now be had. The suits covered by his decision are: People's United States Bank against Post Dispatch and P. O. Inspectors Fulton, Stice and Sullivan for conspiracy and libel \$750,000.

Lewis Publishing Co. against Postmaster Wyman and Chief P. O. Inspector Fulton for conspiracy, libel and damages \$1,000,000.

Another statement reads as follows:—E. G. Lewis, head of the American Woman's League and the Lewis Publishing Co. * was indicted today (July 12) for violation of the postal laws by a Federal Grand Jury here. (St. Louis) After the finding was submitted to the court one juror informed the court that U. S. District Attorney Houts displayed prejudice against Lewis in taking individual jurors out and conferring with them singly. Lewis was formerly indicted in connection with a mail banking scheme, but he was finally exonerated by the courts. *** A special committee of the House of Representatives at Washington this week will hear Lewis' complaint against the Post Office Department." (Journal July 12.)

A charge that needs such work as that attributed to U. S. District Attorney Houts (as far as I know, uncontradicted) of which every true American must be ashamed, surely has very meagre evidence on hand.

Have the Portland papers reported an item we received by

wire from St. Louis that on July 29 judgement was given against the Rural New Yorker for \$30,000?

This is the paper from which the Oregonian has been printing articles against E. G. Lewis. I want to press the point that E. G. Lewis, be he patriot or fraud is not the American Woman's League. On July 22 the Oregonian had the following, though not with big headlines or on the front page:—St. Louis, July 21. It has been definitely decided the property of the American Woman's League, which has Chapter Houses scattered from Ohio to Colorado is not included in the courts orders. Therecord on the docket shows also that after the decision was read the judge scratched reference to the University City Art Building, officially known as the Art Institute of the A. M. L. and it will not be included in the property to be controlled by the receiver."
