WHEELBARROW SALARY AND AN AUTOMOBILE TASTE

As a gentle reminder to young men in general, the Portland Journal in speaking of Alexander, the defaulting railroad clerk, of Portland, says:

"Young Alexander had his time. He is at the end of his tether. Hope is behind, and prisons frown ahead. It didn't pay.

"It is the familiar story of a wheelbarrow salary and an automobile taste. The grills beckoned, and the lights lured. The great White Way glittered, and he heard its call. It was a life of show, of gaudy trappings, of music and whirling taxicabs.

"The great maelstrom of a big city spread out its life of gilded gaiety, and it wooed him. The tawdry veneer of fast living sang to him in siren strains, and the furbelows and frills of the smart sets appealed to his imagination. He hadn't the price from an honest salary, but he got forbidden money by tampering with the figures in vouchers, and plunged into the game.

"He is only one among the multitude of his kind. His case differs mainly in degree, and in a few details. There are countless others who ape the ways of the rich. There are men and men with a beer salary and a champagne taste. There are women and women with pony assets and a buzz wagon ambition. There are families and families in the swirl of a ten-thousand-dollar-a-year social circle on a two-thousand-dollar-a-year income. "Rivalry for gewgaws and shows a recruiting agency for the courts, the jails and the morgues. Many a bank employee flees to Canada because his wife attempts to outdo his employer's wife in dress. Many a father is laid under the daisies before his time because wife, daughter and son insisted on keeping up with the procession. It is probable that the popular mania for traveling with the aristocracy is as demoralizing to the race as intoxicating liquors and that is saying a great deal.

"It is all a bogus existence. It is the froth, not the substance of real living. The true test of the membership in the real aristocracy is not drinking champagne and reveling in the lights at the midnight grills, after the manner of young Alexander. The real nobleman is the man, who with his family, knows the figures of an honest salary and cuts his goings and comings to fit."
