Wiley says he learns from conversation he has had with the head surveyor for the Oregon Electric, that a cut of forty feet is planned for through the pass at Rex and that it will come out at his garden back of the house. Coming toward Newberg the line will likely follow the Southern Pacific track around the hill but will run much lower down. Two lines were run from Rex toward Portland, one on the south side of the S. P. track and another crossing the S. P. track makes a straight line for Garden Home, where connection is made with the main line running from Portland to Salem. This latter survey would make the distance to Portland some three miles shorter than by way of the Southern Pacific.

The G. A. R. Veteran, J. C. Wills, who was a member of Co. D., Twelfth Wisconsin Infantry, has the published story of the Jubilee Reunion of the old regiment held at West Bend, Wisconsin, in August of last year which he prizes very highly. To The Taxpayers of Newberg and Vicinity.

The County Treasurer of Yamhill county deposits the tax money of the county in the three banks in McMinnville. Thereby the fourteen banks of this county except the three banks in the county seat get no advantage of the county funds. The sheriff and treasurer were interviewed on the subject of a fair distribution of the county funds, with no immediate promise except that all tax money paid into the hands of Mr. R. B. Linville which he deposits in the two local banks would be allowed to remain temporarily. Mr. Linville remitting to the sheriff by securing certificates of deposit in favor of the sheriff and the treasurer who hold such certificates till actually needed. The taxpayers will confer a favor on the Newberg banks by paying in their tax money to Mr. R. B. Linville or by coming to the local banks and securing a certificate of deposit payable to the sheriff and send same direct, in payment of taxes instead of sending in their individual checks.
