BITULITHIC PAVEMENT— A CONCISE DESCRIPTION

The essential principles of Bitulithic pavement are the durability and resistance to destructive traffic and other conditions, which can be only secured through the use of mineral ingredients so combined as to have almost the compactness and resistance of solid stone. However, the solid stone would not be suitable because of its lack of resiliency and the absence of elasticity, the tendency to abrade and thus wear away under the influence of traffic.

In Bitulithic the desirable essential elements have been preserved and the weaknesses eliminated by the combination of various sizes of stone so mixed as to reduce the voids or interstices to a minimum and these voids are filled with a waterproof elastic cement which produces the necessary ease of traction and at the same time binds the mineral ingredients permanently together.

Bitulithic equals asphalt in smoothness of surface, freedom from noise and in the ease with which it can be kept clean and repaired when worn; but it is much more durable, furnishes a firm foothold for horses and automobiles, is laid much more rapidly and is ready for use as soon as laid.

Wood blocks are unsanitary, they wear off unevenly and when laid with the proper amount of creosote they are too costly. (Corvallis Republican, Corvallis, Ore.)

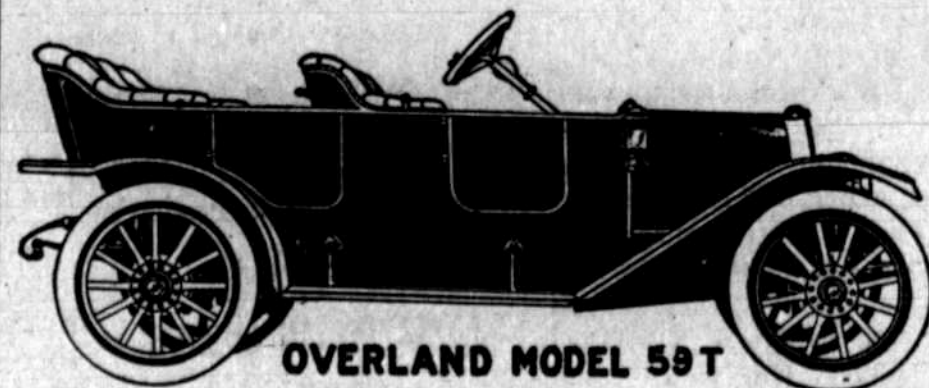
