COMMERCIAL CLUB

Board of Governors Hold Regular Monthly Meeting.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Governors of the Newberg Commercial Club held Friday evening, April 26th, there were present J. E. Hale, president, and E. C. Baird, R. H. C. Bennett and W. S. Wharton. The House Rules were amended to read as follows:

Rule No. 1. "No smoking or chewing of tobacco in the two front parlors."

Rule No. 2. "All playing of billiards, pool and cards prohibited on Sunday."

Rule No. 3. "No gambling, drinking of intoxicants, boisterous, vulgar or profane language allowed."

Rule No. 4. The charge for playing billiards shall be ten cents per cue, pool five cents per cue each player paying for "his own" cue at the end of each game; no person shall be allowed to play billiards or pool, who does not pay for their game.

Rule No. 5. Any member may extend the courtesies of the club to non-residents for a period not exceeding two weeks, but they must first introduce them to the president or secretary, and procure for them a visitor's card.

Rule No. 6. All invitations and privileges to non-residents shall be subject, at all times, if for cause, to be withdrawn or cancelled by the Board of Governors.

Rule No. 7. No person a resident of the city of Newberg or vicinity, who is not a member of the club, shall have the privileges of the club oftener than once a month, and then, only when they are accompanied by a member of the club in good standing.

Rule No. 8. Members of the club desiring to have private parties or business meetings in the club rooms, must apply to

both the president and secretary, and make arrangements in advance.

Rule No. 9. Publications, correspondence, or any other literature, other than advertising literature, belonging to the club, must not be taken from the rooms, or cut or otherwise defaced.

Rule No. 10. No subscription paper or petition, except in relation to the affairs of the club, shall be brought into or circulated in the rooms of the club, nor shall any article be exposed for sale therein.

Rule No. 11. The club rooms shall be closed not later than 11:30 P.M.

Rule No. 12. All complaints must be made to the president or secretary.

Rule No. 13. The penalty for violating Rule No. 3, shall be "expulsion" from the club and forfeiture of all rights and privileges.

The following standing committees were appointed:

"Streets, Highways and Bridges," J. D. Gordon, chairman, Clarence Butt and H. A. Littlefield; "Municipal Affairs," A. P. Oliver, chairman, J. S. Rankin and C. C. Ferguson; "Railroads and Transportation," Jesse Edwards, chairman, Chas. K. Spaulding and U. S. G. Miller; "Public Policy," R. H. C. Bennett, chairman, W. S. Wharton and S. L. Parrett; "Membership," W. B. Fine, chairman, Jno. W. Barcroft, Jr. and L. M. Smith; "Entertainment," C. B. Wilson, chairman; Geo. Larkin and D. D. Coulson.

The committees on "Advertising and Publicity," and "Trade Promotion," as well as the committee on "Finance," will not be appointed until the next regular meeting of the Board in May.

Thus far during the contest for new members there have been quite a number of influential business men of Newberg and
