BRIGHTER THAN OUR SUN.

Puzzle of the Curious Twin Stars Known as Delta Cephei.

None of the modern incandescent, arc or other lights are half as wonderful as the light that nature provides at all times. There are in the sky many lights that the layman has never heard of that are brighter than the sun. Many of these are noted for the brilliancy of their color and the range of their variations.

For instance, there is a star named Delta Cephei, which in the course of about three days alternately gains and loses a large part of its light. The spectroscope has proved that Delta Cephei consists of two stars revolving around one another, much like a pair of double pinwheels, although they never get far enough apart to be separately visible from the earth.

Even when viewed with a telescope their light is blended into a single star disk, although if we could go near enough to them we should find that they are in reality millions of miles apart. When brightest the united light of the twin stars is two or three times greater than when faintest.

One of the explanations offered by astronomers to account for these changes is that one of the stars composing Delta Cephei has a very thick atmospheric veil, consisting of clouds of condensed metallic vapors, and that when the stars draw near one another in their orbital motion the increase of heat dissipates the obscuring veil and permits the star to which it belongs to shine with a splendor that it cannot obtain when its rays are interrupted by its envelope of clouds.

It is difficult to believe that inhabited worlds could exist in the neighborhood of such a pair of suns as that.—Omaha World-Herald.

The Evolution of the Pen.

The patent office at Washington has a collection of pens that illustrates the difficulties with which men had to contend before they found a suitable instrument with which to write. There are the styluses used by the ancients, the instruments for writing on wax tablets, one end sharp like an awl, the other flat like a paper cutter. There are the brushes used by the Japanese and Chinese and quills of every variety, together with an infinite number of steel pens. But the most curious are some quill pens with steel points. They were made in an effort to do away with the constant necessity for the mending of the pen, a process that few could perform properly and that everybody hated. The effort was very ingenious, but unsuccessful, because the points could not be made to stay.

Canewdon is a small Essex village which once held an important place in the making of England. It was here that Canute and his Danes won that decisive victory over Edmund Ironsides which gave the English crown to the Danish pirate. The conqueror named its rising ground "Canute's Down" (Canewdon), and gave the five manors comprising the parish to his son Sweyn. Embracing Christianity, Canute founded a church at Canewdon, and to this day Canewdon gives its name to a rural deanery which includes Southend, eight miles to the south.—Westminster Gazette.

MARRIAGE PENALTIES.

Communities Wherein Matrimony is a Punishable Offense.

Much is heard of the taxation of bachelors, but little is ever said of the communities wherein matrimony is deemed a punishable offense. Perhaps the most extraordinary ideas with reference to this subject may be said to be held at Oxford university in England. There, for instance, a fellow of All Souls college forfeits his fellowship if when studying the classics he should take unto himself a wife. In such event he must not only pay a penalty, but must also present his college with a memorial in the shape of a silver cup, with the further condition that on this cup shall be inscribed in Latin, "He backslid into matrimony."

There is an aristocratic club in London, the Bachelors' of Piccadilly, whereof the members who so far forgot their loyalty to the club as to marry are actually expelled and ostracized. The only saving feature of such expulsion is that by the payment of a fine of \$100 the offending one may retain an honorary membership, but so far as active membership is concerned he is strictly out of it for the rest of his life.

There is a similar organization in Germany, the Jungesellen club. Whenever there comes to the officials of this club any intimation that a member contemplates matrimony he is immediately summoned for trial in the club court, with the president as judge. The culprit is allowed to plead in extenuation of his offense, and upon his skill in presenting such plea depends the amount of his fine, which ranges from \$100 to \$1,000. The humorous feature of the fine consists in the application made. The money is devoted to a dinner, whereat all members appear in mourning attire. At the conclusion of the repast the president solemnly reads the sentence of expulsion, and the delinquent is led from the room amid the groans and lamentations of his erstwhile club members.—Chicago Record-Herald.

The First Elevators.

The idea involved in our modern elevator was anticipated in the middle of the seventeenth century by Velager, who also established the first letter boxes in Paris in 1653. Velager's lift was in demand until a mishap occurred to the king's daughter at Versailles. The mechanism failed to work when she was halfway up, and there she stuck for three long hours until the servants could break away the wall to release her. His "flying chairs" then fell into disrepute. The apparatus was simple in the extreme—just a chair attached to a rope which was passed over a pulley, with a weight as a counterbalance at its other end. In 1860 some one brought out as a new invention an imitation of this primitive lift, which has developed into our hydraulic or electric apparatus.
