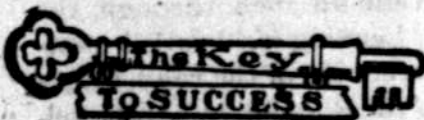

The Council immediately let the paving contracts for the three streets to the Warren Construction Company for bitulithic pavement.

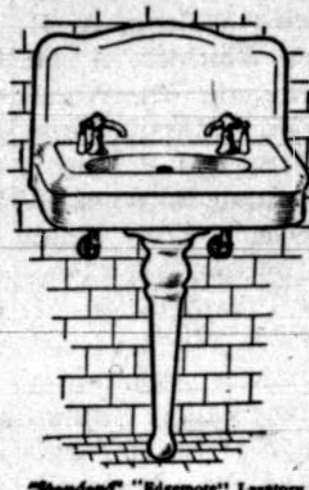
