CHINESE CASES DISPOSED OF

At Hillsboro, on Monday, the case of Wong John, a local Chinaman, against W. A. Hodges of Sherwood, was heard before Judge Campbell, the Chinaman suing for the value of two horses alleged to be worth \$400. These horses were taken on attachment last fall, on advice of Attorney C. W. Corby in an action against another Chinaman. These cases against the Chinese all failed and were put out of court on various grounds. Hodges had a claim for feeding against the horses, and on advice of Attorney C. R. Chapin sold the horses. Thelien was held not good. Judge Campbell gave judgment for \$300 against Mr. Hodges and the costs will amount to at least \$200 additional. Attorney B. A. Kliks of McMinnville appeared for the Chinaman and C. R. Chapin for Mr. Hodges. Messrs. L. F. Hall, John Whiteis, J. T. Carter, William Carter and William Brishine of Newberg were among the witnesses at Hillsboro. The case lasted less than two hours, Judge Campbell refusing any arguments on either side. This is the last of eight cases, in all of which the Chinese were successful.

COUNCIL LETS CONTRACTS FOR SEWERS AND PAVEMENTS

At a meeting of the City Council in executive session to consider the bids for pavements and sewers, contracts were awarded to the Warren Construction Company, which will mean an expenditure of \$180890.40 for civic improvements and will give the city about 60 blocks paved with the celebrated bitulithic pavement, says the Tillamook Herald. Work will have to commence three days after the contract is signed, but it is the intention of the Warren Construction Company to push the work as rapidly as possible, as the street pavement cannot be done after the rainy season sets in.

This contract was let after careful investigation of the merits of other paving, and was awarded for bitulithic because of its proven worth, and because it has withstood every test of time and traffic under all climatic conditions.
