The Oregon Statistical Bureau, in co-operation with O. A. C., is making a preliminary agricultural survey of a number of leading farms in every county in the state, and R. B. Some of the questions asked farmers are: The value of land, machinery and stock on hand June 1; the acreage yield of each crop in 1911; amount of crops sold and the receipts; the amount of other farm products, such as milk, butter, eggs, fruit; the expense for labor, seed, feed, fertilizer, machinery, thrashing; the methods of cultivation used and your observation of the results. Reports of individuals will not be published without their consent, but the information received will be used in making up the final report on the general conditions in the community.
