THE SQUIRREL A TREE PLANTER

The squirrels of the United States rank as nature's most important chestnut, hickory and walnut tree planters. Contrary to common belief, they do not lay up their winter store of nuts in a mass; instead, each nut is buried separately, and since they never need one-tenth of the provender they store, what they do not consume germinates, and in this manner we get the uniform nut-tree forests, which would otherwise grow in clusters under the parent tree where nuts fall.

WHEN THE HORSE REARS

An experienced horseman and ex-cavalry officer says that the horse, when rearing, must always come up straight. He can not rear otherwise. Therefore, the quick-witted rider, when he finds his saddle horse rearing, should promptly pull the horse's head to the right or left, thus throwing him off his balance, when he drops back to the earth on his forefeet. This remedy is used by experienced horsemen, but the rider must act quickly, and by pulling the horse's head to one side as soon as he begins to rear, the horse is outbalanced and can not rear. The rearing horse will repeat his attempt, but the rider simply repeats the
