### BITULITHIC AWARD AT HILLSBORO

At the recent meeting of the city council in that city, another contract was awarded for street pavement. Bitulithic will be used.

Ever since the first bitulithic pavement was laid in Hillsboro, the citizens and taxpayers have gradually been lining up in favor of paved streets everywhere, and now it is almost a universal sentiment. A good share of the credit is due to the character of the pavement used—bitulithic—and to the council which originally named this kind of pavement for the streets of Hillsboro.

This contract was awarded to bitulithic in the face of the fact, like all bitulithic awards necessarily are, that many other "just as good" pavements were offered at from 50 to 100 percent less.

The people of Hillsboro very wisely prefer to "let the other fellow pay for the experimenting."

### BITULITHIC MAKES GOOD IN COLFAX

The Warren Construction Company has been granted the contract to pave Perkins avenue district, thus completing the whole of the paving in Colfax, which is now a bitulithic town in every sense of the word. The efforts of some property owners to bring in other paving and divide the business of the town have come to naught. The company which has paved all of Colfax's streets that have been paved to date, and which has proved so satisfactory, has been granted the exclusive right to the business of the town and no other paving is to be used here. This is not the result solely of action by the city council. Bitulithic paving has given such general satisfaction that there are few property owners who desire any other kind.

### IDAHO FALLS IN LINE

Owing to the magnitude of the award for the streets of Idaho Falls that has been pending for some time past, the interest in the final result has been wide spread.

All the friends of first quality and economy in the long run will be glad to learn that the contract at Idaho Falls was let to the Warren Construction Company of Portland, and that the Falls city streets will be paved with bitulithic.

The council took this action first because the taxpayers of Idaho Falls seemed to prefer bitulithic and secondly because, after thoroughly investigating the record of bitulithic in cities where it has been tried for more than ten years, the council committee found bitulithic to be preferable from every point of view.

### HIS WORST SCARE

A Reminiscence of the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain.

By way of making him talk, for he was afraid of the reminiscing habit of soldiers and it was nearly impossible to get him to speak of his experience in the war, the woman asked him, "Were you never afraid?"

"Of course I was afraid."

"That sounds human. When were you the worst scared—if you don't resent the word?"

"Not a bit. It is a good word to express one kind of a state of mind. Why, it was at the battle of Kennesaw Mountain. We had been fighting all day and driving the other side before us. Just about dusk we came to the foot of the mountain and found the Confederates had strong fortifications well up toward the top of it. Word was sent along our lines that at dawn the next day we were to scale the mountain and take those fortifications. As the word was passed from man to man every face turned white. I never have seen so sick a looking lot of men. At dawn we were to march straight up to certain death, and we had all night to think about it. There would be no possible escape by any one of us. I knew my comrades. There would be no deserters. There would be only corpses, and I would be one of them. I don't know if I was the whitest man in the lot, but I know he would have been had to pick out. I never have been ashamed that I was scared that night."

"But you are here. How did you escape?"

"Well, 'some one had blundered.' The order had been given, but it was a fool one, and fortunately its folly was seen before we had an American Balaklava. The order was recalled, and in its place we received the sane order to move under cover of darkness to a position

where our work would have some value."—New York Press.

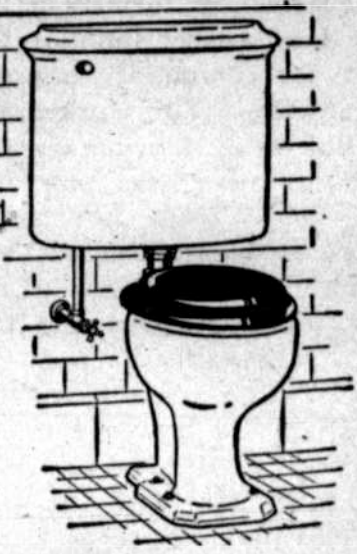
