Montana is determined that no other state shall excel her in the enterprise of her cities.

Bozeman is the latest one to declare for up-to-the minute improvements by awarding a 40,000 yard contract for streets to be paved with bitulithic.

The city council sent a committee to Missoula, Great Falls, and other cities in Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon, to thoroughly investigate the merits of the various kinds of pavements being used, and the committee reported in favor of bitulithic.

MORE PAVING FOR VANCOUVER

More evidence concerning the value and real economy to taxpayers in hardsurfacing urban streets comes from Vancouver, Washington, where the city council of that city has just awarded another contract for bitulithic paving.

Vancouver has for a number of years, been trying out the merits of hard surface pavement, mostly in the form of bitulithic. This provision for more of it to be laid this year, and preparations being made to lay more of it next year, is an endorsement from the taxpayers concerning the value in a general way of hardsurfaced streets for cities and of the value in a specific way of bitulithic.

All the new pavements that are "just as good," so-called, are always thoroughly investigated by the Vancouver council before making final choice for bitulithic. So far, as is apparent in this latest award, they have failed to find anything that equals bitulithic; a decision in which the taxpayers of Vancouver thoroughly concur.

YAMHILL COUNTY CREDITED WITH 239 AUTOMOBILES

Oregon has 7,865 automobiles, according to statistics compiled on August 1, by the Secretary of State's office, and of this number Yamhill county is credited with 239, distributed as follows: Amity, 28; Bellevue, 1; Carlton, 12; Dayton, 10; Dundee, 4; Lafayette, 4; McMinnville, 70; Newberg, 47; Springbrook, 1; Sheridan, 38; Willamina, 5; Yamhill, 19.

McMinnville, with 2,600 people, has 70 automobiles winning over Hillsboro's 50; Forest Grove's 45; Independence's 36; Dallas' 56 and Oregon City's 60. Portland has 3244; Eugene 245; Salem 338; Astoria 76; Medford 273; Corvallis 78.—News-Report.

SOME SUFFRAGE FACTS

One million women in the United States have full political rights.

Utah, a suffrage state, has the largest proportion of home-owners of any state in the Union.

In Denver, the women cast 55 percent of the vote in the large residence wards, and only 4 percent in the slum wards.

In most states about 60 or 65 percent of the men vote. In Wyoming 99 percent of the women vote. In Colorado 80 percent of the women register and 72 percent vote. In Idaho 40 percent of the total vote is cast by women, though women

are in the minority in that state.

In Colorado, in the first eight months after women were enfranchised, more books on political economy and civics were sold than in the whole two years previous.

In Seattle there were never 100 women devoting themselves to the suffrage campaign, but 23,000 women registered at the first election. And 80 percent of the women voting in Seattle this year were married women—women of the "home."

Where women have voted the longest, divorce is only one-eighth as great as in similar states where they do not vote.

About 30,000 women voted in Denver at the last election, and of these only 400 could be connected with any bad element.

There is no nation, no state, no city where women vote, where the vote of the undesirable women even remotely approaches that of the women of good repute.
