CHARGES REASONABLE

J. P. MORGAN DIES IN ROME

Noted American Money King
Succumbs After Weeks
of Failing Health

Rome.—J. Pierpont Morgan, the New York financier, died here Monday.

For months his health had been declining, but the symptoms became greatly aggravated about a week ago, and for several days he had been in a semi-comatose condition. He was within a few days of being 76 years old.

Dr. M. Allen Starr, of New York, called into consultation over the late financier's illness, attributed the recent breakdown to emotion caused by the investigation carried out by the Pujo committee at Washington into the operations of the "money trust."

The official statement, prepared by Dr. Giuseppe Bastianelli, Dr. M. Allen Starr and Dr. George A. Dixon, the attending physicians, indicated that a gradual general collapse followed a condition of nervous prostration which prevented the digestive organs from performing their functions and affected the mental faculties.

For five days Mr. Morgan received artificial nourishment but was unable to assimilate the food. As a result he lost strength rapidly. He was in a condition of semi-coma which prevented him from recognizing those about him for many hours prior to his death. His end was without suffering.

John Pierpont Morgan was born in Hartford, Conn., April 17, 1837. His parents were Junius Spencer Morgan, a business man of that city, and Juliet Pierpont, a daughter of the Rev. John Pierpont, the poet, after whom he was named.

Omaha Homeless Cared For.
Omaha, Neb.—Omaha completed its first week of tornado relief with every family rendered homeless having fairly comfortable places in which to spend the day and everybody supplied with food.

The results of the disaster are as follows: Lives lost, 115; seriously wounded, 322; slightly wounded, not less than 1000; houses totally destroyed, 822; homes partly wrecked, 2100. Property loss \$7,500,000.

MEXICO PROTESTS TO UNITED STATES

Mexico City.—The Mexican government has made a formal protest to the American government against the shipping of arms and ammunition from the United States to the rebels, and has requested that greater vigilance be exercised in guarding the frontier.

Mexican officials understand that numerous consignments of war material, including many machine guns, have been sent across the border, in some cases even at the regular posts of entry, and now are in the hands of the rebels.

It is pointed out by the same officials that, since the rebels control a large part of the frontier, this country is dependent absolutely for the time being on the United States to prevent the rebels from obtaining supplies. That the rebels are securing quantities of ammunition appears to be a fact.

Residents in the capital are nervous because of continued rumors of friction between President Huerta and General Felix Diaz, and of plots and intrigues, even to the fixing of dates when a new battle may be expected in the streets, or the assassination of one or the other of the principals may take place.

People Flee From Ohio River.
St. Louis.—Thousands of residents along the Ohio river from Cincinnati to Cairo fled because of the flood warnings issued by the weather officials. The towns situated on the river are threatened with the most disastrous flood since 1884.

DAYTON PEOPLE NEED HELP

Many Who Have Lost All Will Require Indefinite Aid.

Dayton, O.—The problem presented to Dayton as summarized by George B. Bumba, secretary to Governor Cox, who is representing the governor here, is:

Forty thousand persons must be fed, clothed and housed for a week longer. Twenty thousand persons must be cared for indefinitely. These are persons who lost all when their household goods were swept away. They must be provided with a few necessary household articles, such as bedding, pots and pans, stoves and a few dollars.

Page Ambassador to England.

Washington.—Walter H. Page, of Garden City, L. I., editor of the World's Work and a member of Doubleday, Page & Co., publishers, has accepted President Wilson's offer to be ambassador to Great Britain.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

How Alien Woman Can Be Citizen
Salem.—Relying upon that principle of law which says the civil status of a husband shall determine the civil status of his wife, Attorney-General Crawford rendered an opinion that the alien wife of an alien husband who had declared his intention to become a citizen, may either make herself eligible to vote by declaring her intention of becoming a citizen, or she can let the law take its course and let the declaration of her husband be considered as her own declaration.

TO RECONSIDER LAND CASES

General Land Office Agrees to Reopen Applications Under Isolated Law
Washington.—On request of Representative Sinnott, the general land office has agreed to take up, on motion for reconsideration, various applications for the purchase of land in Walla Walla county, under the isolated tract law. There are many of these cases which were rejected on technicalities.

Carl Roe, who has been United States commissioner at Enterprise for a number of years, has addressed Congressman Sinnott on this subject at considerable length. He says that during the past year or so he has been called upon to make out a large number of applications for the sale of land under the isolated tract law, which provides that the land, "a greater part of which is too mountainous for cultivation," may be ordered into market upon the application of a person who owns land or holds a valid entry of land adjoining. This law was signed by the president March 28, 1912.

Oregon Teachers Serve New England

Salem.—The Oregon teachers will be given an opportunity during the coming school year to teach and study life in Massachusetts, and teachers of that state will have the opportunity to teach in this state, for State Superintendent Alderman, while in the east, made an arrangement with the City Superintendent of Brockton for an exchange of teachers for a year. Superintendent Alderman intends to take the plan up with other schools, and believes that he will be successful and that it will operate greatly to the benefit of the both states. The salaries paid teachers in the two states are about the same, and the understanding would be that the positions of the teachers in their home states would be kept open for them against their return after a year's absence.

OREGON SENATORS BUSY

Patronage is Occupying Much Time; Both Want General Legislation

Washington.—Just how much general legislation will be allowed at the special session is a matter which is interesting Senator Chamberlain and the whole Oregon delegation. There are a good many things that are of interest to Oregon, and the senators as well as the representatives from Oregon would like to see them brought up and, if possible, pushed through.

The disposition of patronage is taking up much time of Senators Chamberlain and Lane, but they have the questions of rivers and harbors work, reclamation, land matters, public buildings and so forth constantly forced on their attention. Chamberlain is very anxious to see work pushed on the Portland postoffice, and so many applications are being received from Portland and other architects for permission to compete for the plans that he is quite hopeful that the building will be a product of Oregon talent.

State Mine Bureau Chosen by West
Salem.—Governor West announced the names of the men he will appoint as members of the bureau of mines and geology, created by an act of the last legislature.

They are N. H. Lawrie of Portland, secretary of the American Mining congress and an alumnus of the school of mines, New York; W. C. Fellows of Granite, superintendent of the Ben Harrison Mines company of that city and an alumnus of the Colorado school of mines; T. S. Mann of Portland, with the Pacific Stoneware company; Dr. J. F. Reidy of Medford, a mine owner; C. T. Prall of Portland, an engineer and good roads advocate. In addition the presidents of the University of Oregon and of the Oregon Agricultural College are ex officio members.

Eastern Oregon in Fear of Big Floods

Pendleton.—The cities and towns of eastern Oregon and Washington are preparing for the worst floods in the history of this section. The oldest inhabitants declare the snow to be deeper than ever known before on the Blue Mountains, which shed into the John Day, Deschutes, Umatilla, and Walla Walla rivers, these in turn emptying direct into the Columbia river.

NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

New Tariff Must Provide Revenue Sufficient to Run Government

Washington.—When the gavel falls at noon on April 7 the ways and means committee of the house will be prepared to submit a complete system of revision and ask for its approval. Truth is that the men charged with directing the tariff fight have some misgivings about the bill to be presented and recognize that it may be subject to material amendment when it gets to the senate. In fact, the house leaders will be glad to have the senate assume part of the responsibility for the bill.

House leaders realize that they must do two things. They must make such revision as will be in keeping with their pledges to the people, and at the same time must provide for ample revenue to run the government. They have discovered already that they will need fully as much revenue as has been available during the past few years, for they find they cannot in any material way reduce the expenses of the government.

Revision Must Produce Revenue
With a certainty that a certain amount of revenue must be available each year, tariff revision must be so shaped as to produce that revenue over and above what can be raised under the income tax. How much the income tax will produce will not be known, even approximately, until the tariff bill has passed both branches of congress and been approved by the president, for there is more difference of opinion about this feature of the new tariff bill than over any one other section.

The plan as finally passed upon is understood to provide for raising the income tax revenue on a graduated scale, exempting incomes under \$4000, beginning with a 1 per cent tax on incomes of \$4000 and running as high as 4 per cent on incomes of \$100,000 and upward.

It was said that the plan retains the provisions for free raw sugar and free raw cotton and the 15 per cent tax on raw wool. A fight is expected in both houses for a change to free raw wool. Suffragists Ready to Besiege Wilson
Siege is to be laid to the White House by the suffragists, it was announced at national headquarters, as a result of the refusal of President Wilson to include in his message to congress some reference to the suffrage cause. The president's declaration was based on his belief that congress should take the first steps, and that he would not be justified in inaugurating such a sweeping reform through recommendations.

Representatives Kent, of California, Lenroot of Wisconsin and Anderson of Minnesota, progressive republicans, made a formal announcement that they would not join the house progressives in a new third party organization and would not vote for Representative Murdock for speaker.

Indians to Get Interest

Secretary Lane has signed an order, effective July 1, 1913, providing that all Indian funds on deposit to the credit of superintendents of the various agencies over the United States that hitherto have not drawn interest shall be placed on an interest bearing basis at the rate that prevails in the localities where the money is deposited. Heretofore these funds have not drawn any interest.

It is estimated that these accounts approximate \$1,000,000.

National Capital Brevities

The first formal dinner by President and Mrs. Wilson will be given April 16, in honor of members of the cabinet. Clay Tallman, an attorney of Tonopah, Nev., has been appointed legal adviser of the reclamation service by Secretary of the Interior Lane.

Secretary of War Garrison, Wednesday, ordered that 50,000 tents and 1,000,000 rations be rushed to Ohio from Philadelphia for the relief of the flood sufferers.

One of the best jobs at the disposal of the Wilson administration, that of chief forester, has been placed under the civil service. This position, now held by Prof. Henry S. Graves, a republican, appointed by Taft to succeed Gifford Pinchot, pays \$5000.

On the request of President Wilson, Secretary of War Garrison went to Ohio to personally survey conditions in the flood district. He was accompanied by General Wood. President Wilson was going himself, but later decided to send Garrison as his personal representative.

The special session of congress, it is predicted by democrats of the senate, will be a prolonged affair. It is assumed that President Wilson will ask consideration of the currency question, and other matters of pressing importance insofar as their discussion would not interfere with the right-of-way of tariff revision. Democratic Leader Underwood believes that the tariff will be disposed of in the house by May 1, and in both houses by July 11.
