SIRE AND SONS.

Charles Francis Adams, 2d, treasurer of Harvard university, will act as chief marshal at the Harvard commencement in June next.

Herr Sigmund Springer, the Vienna banker, who recently gave more than \$100,000 to the Austrian Red Cross society, has been made a baron by Emperor Franz Josef.

John Currie Lauder, son of Harry Lauder, the famous Scotch comedian, is completing his third year at Jesus college, Cambridge. He has passed the first part of the law special.

Professor H. E. Clifford, Gordon McKay professor of electrical engineering at Harvard, has been invited to organize a course in graduate study in electrical engineering at the United States Naval academy.

Benjamin R. Stickney, inventor of the new machine which will, it is estimated, save the government at least \$200,000 annually in printing postage stamps, has been in the employ of the federal service for eleven years.

Dr. George Turner, recently knighted in England partly because of his devotion to the lepers at the asylum at Pretoria during his long career in South Africa, is himself a victim of the dread disease, contracted through his work among the afflicted. For several years he has been living in seclusion in England.

Pen, Chisel and Brush.

Janet Scudder, America's most prominent woman sculptor, will superintend the erection of a fountain of her own design on the Rockefeller estate at Tarrytown, N. Y. She has been working in a Paris studio.

Ellis Parker Butler is secretary-treasurer of the recently organized Authors' League of America, with offices in New York. The objects of the league are to promote adequate copyright legislation, to protect the rights and property of authors and to assist authors in the marketing of their product.

Zarah Howlson Pritchard, founder of the new school of submarine painting, lives at Pasadena, Cal., but is a native of India, Irish by birth. He goes down to the bottom of the sea in a diver's suit and with specially prepared equipment sketches rapidly for fifteen or twenty minutes and takes sufficient color notes to enable him to finish his picture in the studio.

Half Mastng a Flag.

When the flag is to be half masted it is first run up to the top of the staff and then lowered to half mast. At sunset it is again hoisted to the top and then lowered to the ground. Never is a flag lowered directly from half mast, nor is the ensign ever displayed at night on a fort except when actually under siege.

Rumelia.

The name Rumelia (in Turkish Rumili) for European Turkey is interesting in its origin. "Rum," the Turkish word for Greek, is itself a corruption of Roman and was applied to the Greeks in Byzantine times as the people of New Rome; "li" means land or country, and the "i" is merely a suffix, marking what one may call the Turkish reflex genitive. The whole name means "the land of the Greeks."

A Tiny Well Digger.

The mole is one of the thirstiest of animals. It never burrows at any great distance from water, and at times of drought, when the supply of the needful element is diminished or cut off, the "little gentleman in the velvet coat" counteracts the scarcity by digging wells until it comes to a depth at which water may be obtained.

Dingy Towels.

Dingy towels may frequently be restored to normal whiteness by putting in a kettle of cold water, adding white soap shavings and lemon juice and letting come slowly to a boil. Rinse in tepid water, then blue water, and hang in the sun.

Tigers of Siberia.

The long haired tiger is still found in considerable numbers in parts of eastern Siberia, especially in the Pri-Amur district, and the largest bears in the world in the Altai mountains.

"Vision of Piers Plowman."

The earliest poem of high value which we meet with in modern English literature is the thrilling and mysterious "Vision of Piers Plowman." This poem has been handed down to posterity in not fewer than forty-five manuscript copies. It is almost certain that Langland wrote the first draft of his poem in 1362, rewrote it in 1377 and revised it again, with large additions, somewhere between 1392 and 1398.

Almanacs in Popsy's Time.

The almanacs of Mr. Popsy's time were overwhelmingly of the prognostication order, and he enjoyed them much as we enjoy "Old Moore" now. Thus, on June 14, 1667, "we read and laughed at Lilly's prophecies this month in his 'Almanac' this year." The prophet certainly seems to have made a record bad shot. For, as the Lord Braybrooke notes, he observed: "The several lunations of this month do rather portend sea fights, wars, etc., than give hopes of peace, particularly the several configurations do very much threaten Holland with a most strange and unusual loss at sea, if they shall dare to fight his majesty's forces. . . . Strange news out of Holland, as if all were in an uproar. We believe they are now in a sad and fearful condition." And June, 1667, saw the Dutch in the Medway.—London Express.

Alloys of Gold and Iron.

Iron and gold when melted together may be mixed in various proportions and hardened or crystallized. Alloys containing 10 per cent of gold are harder than pure iron, but as the proportion of gold increases above that amount the alloy becomes softer. Silver and iron do not form alloys.
