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SUE STANDARD OIL  
FOR \$100,000,000Action Started by the State of  
Texas Against Huge  
Corporation

New York.—With the serving of a subpoena on John D. Archbold it was learned that the state of Texas has begun suit against Standard Oil interests to recover approximately \$100,000,000 for alleged violation of the anti-trust statutes of that state.

Substance of the allegations of the attorney-general of Texas is that the Standard Oil companies of New York, New Jersey, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana practically are under one control. In short, it is set forth that the "Standard Oil trust" still exists and operates the Magnolia Petroleum company as its Texas branch.

It was learned that subpoenas had been served on John D. Rockefeller on the Lakewood golf links and H. C. Folger, Jr., president of the Standard Oil company of New York; Samuel G. Bayne, president of the Seaboard National bank; Howard Bayne, vice-president of the Columbia Knickerbocker Trust company; Charles W. Harkness and Lewis Cass Ledyard.

The suit is declared to be the outcome of disclosures made at the hearings on the Waters-Pierce Oil company litigation in this city a few months ago. The action is not for damages, but for penalties for alleged infringement of Texas laws.

## GREAT STRIKE IN BELGIUM

Workmen Protest Against Government Refusal to Grant Manhood Suffrage.

Brussels.—The great strike of workmen in Belgium to force the government to grant manhood suffrage began quietly, and it was estimated that 200,000 men throughout the country had quit work. This number is at least 100,000 short of the Socialist predictions. Nevertheless, the strike has shown greater strength than was expected by impartial observers. It is believed generally the strikers will be reinforced by several thousand.

Thousands of women and children have been sent out of the country by the workmen so that they may not suffer. The strike leaders say they have \$3,000,000 with which to carry on the movement.

## Montenegro Left to Battle Alone

Cettinje, Montenegro.—Plucky little Montenegro has been left to fight its battle with the powers alone. The Serbian army that has been assisting the Montenegrins in the siege of Scutari has been withdrawn and is marching back to Serbia. Much bitterness is felt throughout Montenegro.

ASSASSIN SHOOT  
AT KING ALPHONSO

Madrid.—For the third time in his reign, King Alfonso narrowly escaped being the victim of an anarchistic attempt against his life. Three shots were fired at the king in the streets of the capital by a native of Barcelona, Rafael Sanchez Allegro, who was immediately overpowered.

King Alfonso owes his escape to his courage, quickness and skilled horsemanship. Accompanied by his staff he was riding along the Calle de Alcalá, returning from the ceremony of swearing in recruits, when a man sprang from the sidewalk and seized the bridle of the king's horse with one hand, pointing a revolver point blank with the other. The king, realizing the situation with lightning rapidity, dug his spurs into his horse, which reared violently.

His quickness saved his life. The bullet, instead of burying itself in the king's breast, struck the horse. So close was the range that the king's left glove was blackened by the powder discharge.

Before the assailant was able to pull the trigger again a secret service man sprang upon him. The two men fell to the ground locked in each other's arms, struggling furiously. The assassin freed his revolver arm and fired two more shots in rapid succession, but the officer knocked his arm aside and the bullets flew harmlessly through the air.

## PERMIT DENIED FRIEDMANN

Surgeon-General Blue Says Claims for Serum Must First Be Upheld.

Washington.—Surgeon-General Blue, of the public health bureau, told Dr. Frederick Franz Friedmann that until the exact nature of his tuberculosis vaccine and the method of its preparation had been revealed and the claims made for it substantiated by official tests and investigations, a license for its sale in interstate commerce could not be issued. This was the surgeon-general's answer when the Berlin scientist asked what steps would be necessary for him to take to obtain such a license.

## President Forces Sugar Schedule Through House Caucus

Washington.—President Wilson scored his first tariff victory when the house democratic caucus, by a vote of 155 to 39, adopted the tentative sugar schedule, making that commodity free after three years of 1 per cent duty.

The vote was taken after Chairman of Ways and Means Committee Underwood had warned the house that the adoption of any of the many amendments placed before it would be a direct affront to the president, who had specifically asked the adoption of the sugar tariff schedule, and would seriously imperil the passage of the bill in the senate.

"The sugar schedule in this bill was not reported from the committee as I personally would have reported it," he said. "It represents, however, the wishes of the president."

The final adoption of the sugar schedule, which Underwood declared meant an ultimate saving to the consumer of \$115,000,000 yearly, followed a day of stormy debate.

Persistent efforts to put cattle and sheep on the free list, to cut the duty on swine and to otherwise alter the ways and means committee tariff revision bill were defeated in the Democratic caucus of the house.

The Democratic leadership fight for the bill as reported was piloted by Representative Francis Burton Harrison, of New York, in the absence of Representative Underwood, the majority leader, who is ill.

Senate Reserves Rights on Tariff.—The attitude of the senate toward President Wilson's tariff plans, as embodied in the new house tariff bill, became fairly well defined after a meeting of the democratic members of the finance committee.

Briefly the senate committee will agree to the view of the president and house as to free wool and one cent sugar, with the "free sugar in three years" attachment, but it will exercise its right to amend other schedules and provisions of the tariff bill as it thinks best.

## Wool Fight Becomes Critical

The fight against free wool has become more acute at both ends of the capitol, and several state delegations in the house are appealing to senators for support in the fight to retain some duty.

Stubborn opposition to the administration's wool program developed when 40 democratic congressmen from wool growing states met and decided to vote with republicans against the house wool schedule which bears President Wilson's stamp of approval.

## Republicans Plan Tariff Contest

In a caucus the republican members of the house laid plans for a vigorous organized opposition to the Underwood tariff bill. The caucus ordered the preparation of amendments to the Underwood bill providing for a non-partisan tariff board and for provisions of the cotton and wool schedules of the tariff.

Republican members of the house ways and means committee were instructed to prepare amendments next Thursday.

## Pure Clothing Wanted

Representative Murdock, progressive leader in the house, wants clothing manufacturers who mark goods "all wool" when they are not, fined and put in jail. He put in a bill proposing a series of labels ranging from "pure wool," to "mixed goods," which would hold manufacturers responsible for proper labeling of their goods.

The penalties range from \$500 to \$1000 fine and a year in prison.

## House Progressives Assign Work

The progressive conference of the house parceled out the work of preparing the measures that will form a part of the progressive legislative plan. The house members will work in conjunction with the legislative committee of the national progressive party, of which Gifford Pinchot, Jane Addams, Dean Lewis, of Pennsylvania University, Walter Weyl and other prominent persons are members.

Ten legislative subjects were assigned to them, and they will form the basis for the legislative campaign of the progressives in the present congress.

## National Capital Brevities

A bill to authorize national banks to lend money on real estate was introduced by Senator Nelson.

Plans for opening Alaskan resources to development as quickly as possible are being considered by President Wilson.

Primary elections for nomination of presidential and vice-presidential candidates is proposed in a bill by Senator Cummins.

The net earnings of corporations of the United States for the calendar year 1912 were \$3,000,000,000, and increase of \$250,000 over 1911. This amount will yield an income to the federal government under the corporate tax law of \$30,000,000.

Capized Mimi Drops From View Bay City.—"Ships that pass in the night" was an expression which every shoreman hereabouts recalled when they awoke to find that the German bark Mimi, which turned turtle, had dropped out of sight completely.

Whether or not the high seas have carried the ill-fated craft further to sea is not known, as all hands have given up the idea of recovering Captain Westphal's papers, or recovering any bodies of the several sailors who passed to watery graves.

## SQUAW DEFIES CITY

Pendleton Water Source Held by Wenix and Red Elk

Pendleton.—Another chapter in the famous case of City of Pendleton vs. Wenix and her son, Red Elk—Cayuse allottees on the Umatilla reservation—was added when the city of Pendleton filed suit against the aged squaw and her son, praying for immediate ejectment of the Indians from the property on which their teepees are now pitched and where they are living, and for \$250 damages.

Through condemnation proceedings two years ago the city acquired title to a small portion of the Wenix allotment, on which there is a spring, and \$2500 was given her for same by the court. She has never drawn out a dollar of the money awarded her, nor has she made any attempt to move from the spot where she has lived for a great number of years. Her son, Red Elk, also has refused to move.

The same spirit of resistance exhibited from the time the first overture was made for the purchasing of the land until the matter had been settled in court is still in evidence.

## Gasoline Schooner Sticks on Spit.

Florence.—The gasoline schooner Anvil from Bandon, which ran aground here inside the mouth of Stuslaw river, lost her rudder and is lying on the north spit about 600 yards below the end of the jetty. The boat is high and dry at low water and is close to the place where the Berwick was wrecked some years ago.

The Umpqua lifesaving crew put an anchor out from the boat toward the river channel. The cargo is being taken off and efforts to float the vessel made.

## RAILROAD TO BUILD TO BEND

With Organization Fixed, Contracts May Be Let Within Three Weeks

Salem.—Announcement was made by John H. McNary, attorney for the company, that organization of the Oregon Railroad Company was about perfected and that within three weeks contracts for constructing a portion of the road bed would be awarded.

The company proposes to construct a road from Salem to Bend by way of Stayton and through the Minto Pass, one of the few available railroad passes through the Cascade Mountains.

Just who is backing the road is not certain. It will have direct connections here with Hill and Harriman properties and will have the same at Bend. It will tap the Rosedale district, go through the West Stayton irrigated districts and will tap one of the richest timbered sections in the state along the Santiam and the Breitenbush.

## Criticism of Garibaldi Crew in Wreck

Bay City.—Investigation of the efficiency of the Garibaldi life-saving crew, Captain Farley, in connection with the disaster when the German bark Mimi capized, drowning 18 men, was begun at Garibaldi. Captain Queen of the United States navy is in charge.

Criticism of the lifesavers was severe among the spectators during the long wait between the turning over of the Mimi, about 3 o'clock April 7, and the rescue of the four survivors 26 hours later. It was said that Captain Farley refused to go out to ascertain whether the men were still aboard and that he did not reach the wreck until Monday morning, shortly before the arrival of the Point Adams life-saving crew.

## Big Filing System Needed.

Salem.—What will probably be the most elaborate filing system in the state is being arranged by S. A. Koser, assistant secretary of state, to be used in connection with registration under the Gill law.

Under that law, which goes into effect June 3, the secretary of state must keep an accurate list of all the registrations in the state. Mr. Koser says that for the registration filing system alone much larger space will be required than the entire filing space now given to the secretary of state's office.
