WAR SPIRIT FOSTERED BY GUN MAKERS.

If anyone strives to make enmity between two friends or between two families which for years have lived next door to each other in peace, he is rightly condemned as a mischief maker and a communal danger, says The Dalles Optimist. Still worse is it when men in their craving for wealth seek to breed war between two great neighboring nations, and yet that is just what the Krupps and other German firms have done their utmost to bring about.

Those firms, in the pursuit of their wicked plan, subsidized papers in both France and Germany to stir up war feeling between the two powers so that large orders for guns, ships and other war material might be placed with them. They did not scruple to stir up the worst passions of the people, if only they

could make larger profits. The whole thing was cold blooded in the extreme, and it would have succeeded if the plot had not been discovered in time. There is every reason to believe that the same plan, and for the same purpose, has been followed in England and Germany, and that it is mainly responsible for the suspicion and jealousy with which these two great nations have viewed each other for some years.

There is also a strong belief that in this country there is a very close relation between the war scares that periodically arise and the cry for more forts and a larger army and navy.

The peoples of the world want to live in peace and good will with each other and foster trade and commerce, but selfish men in all lands, in order to gain their ends, are actively engaged in stirring up bad blood and would be only too glad to see nations flying at each other's throats.

Potatoes to Fatten Pigs.

An experiment to test the feeding value of raw or steamed potatoes as supplementary feed with a grain ration, has been carried on by Robt. Withycomb at the Eastern Oregon experiment station, with interesting results, which will be of special value this year on account of the superabundant potato crop.

The hogs in the experiment were divided into eight lots and records of the different feed ration given each and the proportionate gain made were kept carefully. Each hog in lots 1 and 2 ate an average of 170.18 pounds barley and 509.53 pounds of raw potatoes, making a gain in weight of 60.70 pounds. Those in lots 3 and 4 ate 110.30 pounds of barley and 663.75 pounds steamed potatoes, and made a gain of 70.67 pounds while those in lots 5 and 6 ate 188.60 pounds barley and 564.80 pounds steamed potatoes and made a gain of 78.10 pounds. Lots 7 and 8 ate 300.10 pounds barley without potatoes and made a gain of 69.5 pounds.

The last 2 lots, fed barley alone, were used as a check on the others to show more definitely the proportionate value of the potatoes. At the present market value of \$.07 a pound live weight, the hogs fed barley made a \$4.87 gain, which makes the barley feeding value \$1.62 to the hundred.

Lots 1 and 2 fed barley and raw potatoes at the rate of 3 pounds of potatoes to a pound of barley, made a \$4.25 gain, which gives the raw potatoes a feeding value of \$.29 to the hundred. Lots 3 and 4 receiving 6 times as much steamed potatoes as barley, made a \$4.94 gain, giving the steamed potatoes a feeding value of \$.47 to the hundred. Lots 5 and 6 fed three times as much steamed potatoes as barley, made a \$5.47 gain making the feeding value of the potatoes \$.42 to the hundred.

It is noticeable that those fed six times as much potatoes as grain did not make quite the gain made by the other, but it required 85.25 pounds less barley to make this gain, so the difference in feeding value is accounted for.

It is also noteworthy that the steamed potatoes are worth \$.13 more to the hundred than raw for feeding, as shown in the comparison of the gains of animals fed the 3 to 1 ration.

A ROYAL FROLIC.

Napoleon's Practical Joke Insulted Empress Eugenie.

A fondness for joking is often a trait of royal personages, who perhaps find in nonsense a cheerful relief from the decorous tedium of their official appearance. The New York Times recalls an instance in which the beautiful Empress Eugenie of France was victimized, with the connivance of her husband, Napoleon III., by an amusing pantomime.

A special embassy had arrived in Paris from Burma. Three days after its arrival the court was notified that the solemn reception of the mission by their majesties would take place on the following evening at the Tuilleries. At the appointed hour Napoleon and Eugenie, surrounded by all the principal members of their household, took their places upon the dais in the throne room.

The emperor gave orders for the introduction of the embassy, the folding doors at the farther end of the great hall were thrown open, and a number of white robed and fantastically turbaned individuals, some of them with long, gray beards, crossed the threshold, threw themselves prostrate upon the floor and began to crawl toward the throne with the most extravagant contortions.

The tax upon the gravity of the gentlemen and ladies present was so great that only the frowns of the empress—as usual, most concerned that proper dignity and gravity should prevail—prevented them from laughing outright.

Two-thirds of the way to the throne the three venerable leaders of the embassy stopped wriggling and began to turn somersaults. Eugenie evidently believed that to be the proper method of showing respect in Burma, for when the ordinarily impassive emperor began also to laugh she remonstrated with him for his want of decorum in tones that could be heard by those who stood round the throne.

At that moment the most aged of the Burman ambassadors reached the foot of the throne in a final somersault that landed him prostrate at the feet of the empress with such violence that his head flew off and with it, alas, his long white beard. To the astonished gaze of Eugenie were revealed the features of the Marquis de Gallifet, afterward a celebrated general and minister of war, but then a dashing cavalry captain. Every one broke into shouts of laughter, especially when the remaining members of the embassy removed their beards and turbans and were recognized as members of the imperial entourage.

Every one enjoyed the joke except the empress. She burst into a flood of tears, declared that she had been cruelly insulted, swept out of the throne room and left Paris in anger on the following morning. Every one who believes that practical jokes, even when amusing, have a savor of meanness will be glad to know that it was several weeks before Napoleon could make his peace with her.
