OBITUARY.

James W. Douglas was born, May 18, 1841, near Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and died, May 17, 1913, at Newberg, Oregon. He lived near Milwaukee until he was 13 years of age, when he moved with his parents to Green County, Wisconsin. He was married to Mary A. Moore, September 29, 1861. As a result of this union there were four sons and two daughters, one son and daughter having preceded him to the great beyond. Those still living are W. W. Douglas, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Frank J. and A. H. Douglas, of Brodhead, Wis., and Mrs. J. B. Hunt, of Newberg. He leaves besides wife and children, 17 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. He enlisted in the 18th Wis. volunteers' January 18, 1862, and was honorably discharged, January 15, 1865, after having served his country nearly three years. Ten years ago he moved to Newberg, Oregon, where he resided until the time of his death. Mr. and Mrs. Douglas celebrated their golden wedding, September 29, 1911. Mr. Douglas was the last survivor of eleven children of John Douglas.
