Government Whitewash.

Take half a bushel of unslacked lime, slake it with boiling water, cover during the process to keep

in steam, strain the liquid through a fine sieve or strainer, and add to it a peck of salt, previously dissolved in warm water, 3 pounds of ground rice-boiled to a thin paste and stirred in while hot, half a pound of Spanish whiting and 1 pound of clean glue, previously dissolved by soaking in cold water, and then hanging over a slow fire in a small pot hung in a larger one filled with water. Add five gallons of hot water to the mixture, stir well, and let it stand a few days, covered from dirt. It should be applied hot, for which purpose it can be kept in a kettle or portable furnace. The east end of the president's house at Washington is embellished by this brilliant whitewash. It is used by the government to whitewash lighthouses.

A pint of this wash mixture, if properly applied, will cover 1 square yard, and will be almost as serviceable as paint for wood, brick or stone, and is much cheaper than the cheapest paint.

Coloring matter may be added as desired. For cream color add yellow ochre; pearl or lead, add lampblack or ivory black; fawn, add proportionately 4 pounds of umber to 1 pound of Indian red and 1 pound of common lampblack; common stone color, add proportionately 4 pounds raw umber to 2 pounds lampblack.

England's Boasted Power. Europe combined against France and was beaten, the failure being largely due to us. The balance of power being overthrown the war continued for twenty-three years. Our fleet was powerless to bring it to a close. It continued for nearly ten years after our signal victory at Trafalgar. Our army was only able to land very small numbers in Spain and formed about a quarter of the allied force which defeated Napoleon at Waterloo. We have never fought a great land campaign against a European power in the whole of our history. We have never faced a European enemy with more than 40,000 men. The balance has been made up by foreigners. And on the strength of that we talk of having beaten the world!—Lord Percy in the National Review, London.

Salt in Butter. The notion that salt "brings out" the flavor of butter is ridiculous. It spoils it.
