the dates for the cherry fair,
making a mixture of uncorked
patriotism and cherry bounce.An article from Mrs. H. L.

will appear in next week's issue.The old veterans of the Civil
War and their wives are coming
1500 strong, June 17 to 20. Let
Newberg treat them so well that
they will want to come again
soon. It will be the best bit of
advertising we can do.The Portland city election, the
first held under the new Com-
mission form of government, re-
sulted in the election of H. R. Al-
bee for mayor, R. G. Dieck, Wm.
Daly, W. L. Brewster and C. A.
Bigelow as commissioners. The
selection of this class of men to
take care of the interests of the
city makes it look like there was
a better day dawning for Port-
land.Roosevelt was given a "clean
bill of health" at Marquette,
Michigan, the other day, in a
suit brought by him against a
local newspaper man for alleged
damages on account of the
publication of a statement in the
paper to the effect that during
the campaign of last year Roose-
velt was drunk on sundry oc-
casions. Possibly we shall soon
hear of Teddy taking the plat-
form and speaking in favor of
the prohibition of the liquor traf-
fic—save and except his favorite
"white wines."It was with sincere sorrow
that we read in last Monday's
Oregonian of the sudden death of
George F. Robertson, of the
Blake-McFall Co., of Portland,
which occurred on Sunday, fol-
lowing an operation for appen-
dicitis. For the past twenty
years we have known Mr.
Robertson and we always found
him to be a most pleasant and
agreeable gentleman to do busi-
ness with. The last time we met
him at the big paper house,
which was only two weeks ago,
he went out of his way after
closing hours on Saturday after-
noon to do us a favor, and so it
was we always found him.Some of the people living out
north along the foot of the
mountain seem to have a num-
ber of grievances against New-
berg and Howard Walton is the
spokesman for them. The Graph-
ic is perfectly willing to be the
medium through which their
complaints may be made public,
but we must insist that he cut
out his personal thrusts in dis-
cussing the questions at issue.
The Graphic has erred in the
past in giving place to this sort
of argument, out of a desire to

appear in the Graphic.While in Portland last Sat-
urday we had a talk with C. A.
Williams, Assistant Adjutant
General of the Department of
Oregon, G. A. R. and he stated
that the railroads were making
a half fare rate to Newberg for
the State Encampment, June 17
to 20, and that he believed that
no less than 1500 people wouldbe in attendance. This means a
lot of transient people for New-
berg to take care of and we must
all get busy and be in readiness
to do our part in the way of
furnishing accommodations for
them. The old soldiers have
never gotten through telling of
the good times they had when
they held the Encampment here
a few years ago, and they are
expecting to enjoy themselves
this time. We must see that our
reputation for hospitality is
maintained and that the old
veterans and their wives go
away feeling that they have
again been among their friends.
Let the younger generation sleep
under the trees in the back yard,
if necessary, during Encamp-
ment week, in order that all the
visitors may be supplied with
comfortable quarters. Let the
glad hand be extended to all
who come and such a welcome
given that our visitors will want
to prolong their stay in New-
berg.

DIRECT GOVERNMENT

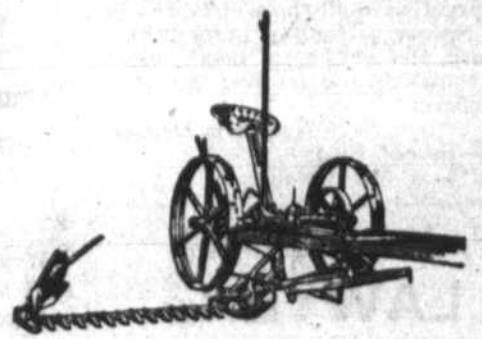
Under the head of "Fact and
Comment" the Youths Compan-
ion devotes a page each week to
the discussion, in a terse way, of
various subjects that are of vital
interest to the general public.
The writer takes pleasure in
reading this page for the reason
that what is said is not only full
of interest, but it comes from an
unbiased source, entirely inde-
pendent of political bias, and
contains much that is valuable,
given in little space. Under the
head of "Direct Government" here
follows some objections given
by the Companion to the Rec-
all:1. It does not seem fair that
a man elected for a stated term
by a majority or plurality of the
voters should be forced to get re-
elected whenever a comparative-
ly small minority is dissatisfied
with his conduct.2. The popularity of a public
servant's actions is made the
test of his value; yet it is known
that the noblest and wisest of
public men, including Washing-
ton and Lincoln, have deliberat-
ely incurred temporary unpopu-
larity.3. Public officials will be con-
stantly tempted to court popu-
larity, even against their con-
sciences.4. Civil service reformers and
other students of the public ser-
vice favor a reasonably secure
tenure of office as against a ten-
ure dependent entirely on popu-
lar favor. Moreover, in all non-
political business it is thoughtwise to give appointees and em-
ployees reasonable time to show
their worth.5. The Recall undoubtedly
gives an opening to mere spite
and prejudice, and to mere par-
tizanship.6. The slight experience we
have had with it yields no proof
of its good effect to set against
these considerations.As to the Recall of judges, all
these considerations apply with
full force, and there is this besides:As a judge is a specially trained
official, the average voter has
peculiar difficulty in estimating
his worth. Dignity is essential
to the bench, and the Recall may
impair it. Independence is still
more essential, and the Recall
may impair that. If immediate
popularity is an untrustworthy
test of executive acts, it is a far
poorer criterion of judicial deci-
sions.The Companion has no hesita-
tion in saying that at least ex-
treme caution should be used in
experimenting with the Recall,
particularly as it is applied to
the courts. Of the several forms
of direct government, it is the
least tested, and is open to the
most disquieting objections.
