The Rose Exhibit will open June 18th in the Ehret building, corner First and Meridian Sts. A committee of women will beat the building at 7:30 o'clock to receive and assist in placing the rose exhibits. All exhibits of roses should be in place by 10 a. m., so that the judges may complete their work and make awards by noon.

The following prizes have been offered: For the best four roses of any named variety in red, white, pink and yellow colors, a potted palm; any three varieties three blooms each, three dahlia plants; vase containing three blooms of best new rose, one-half dozen chrysanthemum plants; vase of six white roses not mentioned in this list, one-half dozen chrysanthemum plants; vase of blue roses; three dahlia plants, five Marechal Neil roses; one dozen aster plants, five white Mamon Cochet; one dozen aster plants, five pink Mamon Cochet; one dozen aster plants, five Frau Karl Druschki; one dozen aster plants, twelve Carline Testouts, three rose plant; twenty-five Carline Testouts, three rose plants; fifty Carline Testouts, four rose plants; six La France pink, three rose plants; six Kaiserine Augusta Victoria, three rose plants; six Gloria Lyonnaise, three rose plants; fifteen red roses any one variety (not Ulrich Brunner), one half doz. chrysanthemum plants, six Ulrich Brunner, one-half doz. chrysanthemum plants; five Papa Gontier, one-half dozen Gladioli bulbs; five J. B. Clark, one-half dozen Gladioli bulbs; three bowls each containing five yellow roses, one-half dozen Gladioli bulbs; best collection, five rose plants.

For prizes the Kilton Floral Co. offers a potted palm; John Gower, one dozen roses; Henry Clemmens, four dozen aster plants, one dozen chrysanthemums, two dozen Gladioli bulbs, six Dahlia plants. Rose plants to be delivered in the fall.

NEWBERG TO BE IN GALA ATTIRE NEXT WEEK

Our best "bib and tucker" is to be put on during Encampment next week, and our streets will be decorated as never before.

The committee on decorations has let a contract to the Sanford Decorating Co. of Los Angeles for decorating ten blocks on First and Main streets, the contract calling for four lines of streamers for each block. The company is also contracting with the various business houses for decorating stores and offices, and this, with the decorating of private residences which many are arranging for, is going to put Newberg in the first rank among the valley towns in a show of civic pride.

SEVENTH DAY ADVENTISTS GIVE LIBERALLY TO MISSIONS

During the past four years the Sabbath Schools of the Seventh Day Adventist denomination in North America gave \$623,708.30 for the furtherance of the gospel in foreign lands, according to a report rendered by Secretary, Geo. B. Thompson, before the delegates at the world conference of Seventh Day Adventists now in session in Washington, D. C. An extract of this report has been received by Mrs. H. L. Owen, secretary of the S. S. of the local Adventist church, and the members were much interested in the progress mentioned in it.

During the quadremial period of 1905-1908 the Sabbath Schools gave \$273,141 to missions, the increase over this amount during the quadremial period ending in 1912 being \$359,636.

The motto adopted at the present session of the General Conference for the coming four years was a "million dollars to missions." The report further showed that in 1908 the denomination had 3,747 Sabbath schools, 1,260 of which were in foreign fields and 2,478 in America. During the four years of the

General Conference period, the schools had grown to 4,467 of which 1,845 were in foreign lands and 2,614 in home fields, making an increase of 574 foreign and 136 home Sabbath schools since the General Conference. Four years ago there was a membership in the Sabbath schools of 88,843 of which 22,011 were in the foreign fields. During the quadremial period there has been an increase in membership of 25,170 of which 23,678 has been in foreign lands and 1,492 in home fields, the membership in the foreign fields having doubled during the past four years.

During the four years 3,542 of the Sabbath school scholars have been converted and most of them baptised.

Since 1867 when the first deposit for missions was made by the schools, they have donated \$1,313,580 for missions. The record of offerings to missions in 1912 from the Sabbath schools was said to be especially encouraging, as during the year \$228,029 was given, which was an increase of \$71,540 over 1911. Four years ago the Sabbath schools of the denomination were giving less than \$2,000 a week to missions; now they are giving almost \$5,000 a week.

The members of the local Sabbath school are especially interested in the recommendations made to the General conference which are as follows:

That attention be given as never before to make the Sabbath schools a great power in saving souls; that some plan be devised at this conference which will result in increased study of the lessons; that the Sabbath School workers' training school be continued; that the officers of the Sabbath school be elected the same as other church officers, and serve for one year instead of six months as at present; and that the secretaries of the Sabbath school work in the various conferences be chosen who can give their entire time to that work.
